

SALES REPORTED HEAVY ON MARTS

Practically All Grades Of
Tobacco Registered
Losses Yesterday

Practically all grades of flue-cured tobacco registered losses Tuesday in the Border Belt and Eastern North Carolina markets, with sales continuing to be heavy and reports of blocks coming from many quarters, according to the Federal-State Marketing News Service.

Almost all of Monday's gains were lost yesterday on the Border Belt, as prices for most grades dropped from \$1 to \$13 per hundred. Showing the greatest declines were inferior quality leaf smoking leaf, and mixed lugs.

The Border Belt Market, according to the Federal-State News Service, appears to be more erratic than before the recent five-day sales holiday. A fairly large volume of tobacco was reported as going to the Tobacco Cooperative Stabilization Corporation. There were many reports of rejections.

The Eastern North Carolina market reported losses from \$2 to \$5 over Monday's prices, and losses on some of the heavier grades of leaf and fair lemon lugs were from \$6 to \$10 per hundred. A few orange cutters and better lugs were the hold grades that held to previous levels.

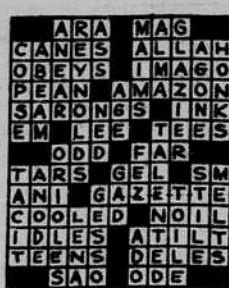

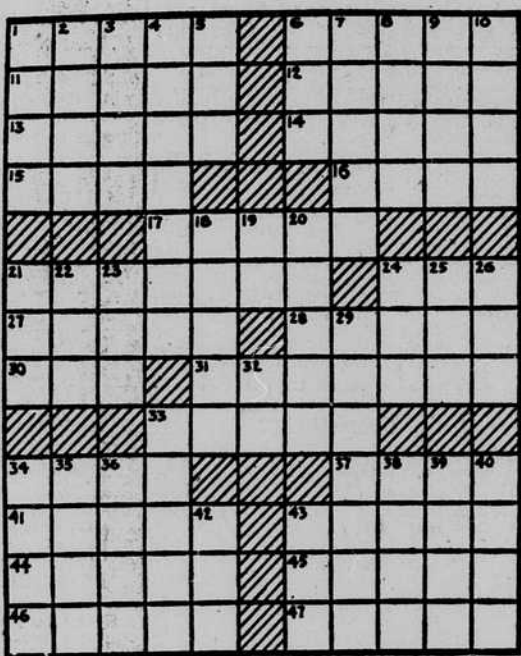

Bevin, and that Bevin "takes a serious view of Arab threats."

Attlee urged maintenance of what he called the "natural friendship" between Britain and the Arab peoples, reminding Syria and Lebanon that their presence in the United Nations was "due to British encouragement and assistance," and recalling that Britain supported Trans-Jordan's application for United Nations membership. The Soviet Union opposed that application.

Only in Palestine, he said, "has there been a conflict in principle between British policy and Arab aspirations." He promised Arabs all possible British aid "to help you in promoting economic expansion and social progress."

Attlee, welcoming the delegates, said the British government deplored the "state of unrest and disturbance into which Palestine has been plunged, to the detriment of interests there," and added "it is a state which cannot be permitted to continue."

Homes Searched

As he spoke, thousands of British troops searched Tel Aviv and a nearby town for perpetrators of bombings which killed three and injured a dozen persons in Northern Palestine Monday night.

Faris Bey El Khouri, president of the Syrian Chamber of deputies and official spokesman for the delegates from Egypt, Iraq, Lebanon, Saudi Arabia, Yemen, Trans-Jordan and Syria, will reply Wednesday to Attlee's address which urged both Arabs and Jews to "make concessions necessary for peace" in the Holy Land.

on Nantucket and Martha's Vineyard.

Fifteen thousand members of the Independent Union of Marine firemen on the Pacific coast were being polled for a strike early Thursday morning to add weight to the AFL protest against the WSB's adverse pay raise ruling.

The union representative in Washington for the WSB hearing, J. R. Gormley, predicted the men "will be on the beach" Thursday unless the board grants them an additional \$5 a month.

The sixth day of the strike—already described by shipping quarters as the costliest in maritime history—found some of the nation's basic industries facing a shutdown due to the loss of vital exports and imports.

Mills turning out flour, steel and cement to fill huge overseas orders were forced to pile their output in warehouses with empty space vanishing rapidly.

Postal Bottleneck

Freight car loadings for seaports were banned at the outset of the strike by the Association of American railroads, already struggling to relieve a shortage of about 100,000 cars a week.

The seaport bottleneck finally resulted in an order by postal authorities to withhold all mail with overseas addresses at inland concentration points.

New York, New Orleans and San Francisco, the major terminals for foreign mail, were beginning to feel the strain on storage facilities.

In New England, sugar refiners, shoe and leather factories were running low on raw materials. Many of the 30 vessels tied up in Boston harbor were loaded with sorely needed imports.

Five wool ships, three vessels laden with hides and one sugar ship were among those waiting to be emptied of their cargo.

At New Orleans a spokesman said the Henderson Sugar Refinery, Inc., will be shut down within two or three days unless 10,000 bags of raw sugar aboard the SS Cape Nun are moved into the plant.

Ten burlap bag factories in the New Orleans area will close within a week unless 6,000 bales of burlap are unloaded from the SS Mobile City, one manufacturer said.

Grain Tied Up

Pickets on the Erie canal at Albany, N. Y., had tied up 400,000 bushels of grain moving down from the Great Lakes on barges.

In Washington the WSB heard additional testimony—all of it supporting the demands of 90,000 AFL seamen for award of the full \$22.50 a month raise won on the West coast and \$27.50 in the East—and then announced a second meeting for today to study the matter.

The controversy was provoked by the board's Aug. 23 decision to limit the AFL raises to \$17.50 a month, the same amount granted CIO seamen in their campaign for wage increases last June.

The present scale for the 43,000 seamen affected is \$145 a month. The Army and Navy already were engaging in limited loading and harbor operations to aid government vessels hit by the strike, but there was no suggestion thus far of any government strike-breaking policy.

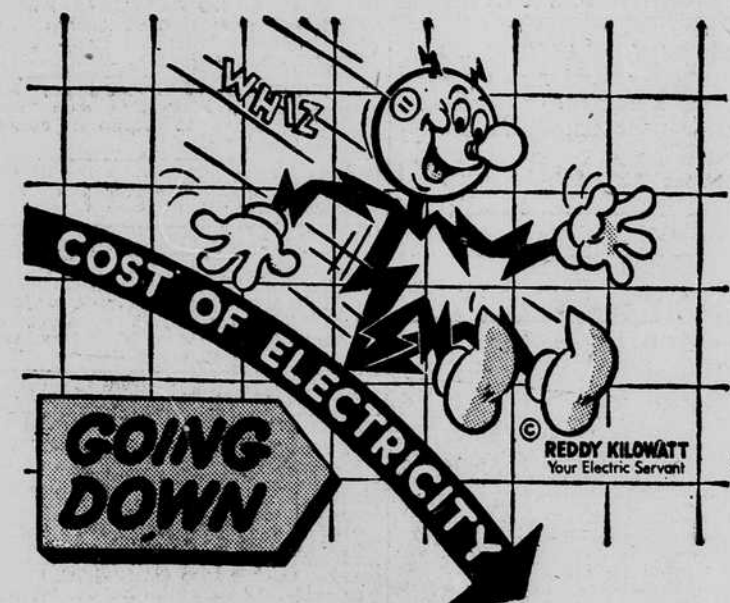
