CIVIL SERVICE AND TALENTS. A civil service examination is a valua ble adjunct to our science of govern ment, and though we cannot afford to pay very high for talent we must have the talent. It is desirable, bu not required, that applicants should have an elementary knowledge of mineralogy, paleon-tology, chemistry, etymology and animal and vegetable physiology.

Thomas L. Huggard, who was the ashier of the now defunct Shackamaxon casher of the now definet successful and who was sentenced on March 24 last to fifteen months' impris ment after having been convicted of conspiracy to wreck that institution, was liberated last night on a pardon, granted by the Board of Pardon, after having served about eight months of his sentence. The failure of the Shackamaxon Bank was the ruling sen-sation at the time of its collapse, and Huggard and the paying-teller were soon after arrested and convicted of conspiracy. President George Bumm, who had also been indicted and whose trial was set at the same time as that of his associates, died before that event oc-curred. All of those connected with the Shakamaxon Bank were prominent both in social and business circles, and the reckless methods adopted in the management of the institution caused a decided sensation when the crisis was reached.
