W. James Harris returned home Saturday noon from St. Lukes hospital in Spokane, where he underwent surgery. He is reportedly now at home recovering nicely.

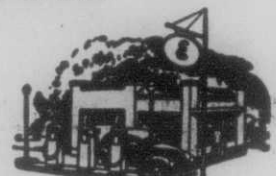
