BOOM FOR COEUR D'ALENE.
A dispatch of recent date from Bossman, Montana, speaks as follows of the new mines. It is a little "stretched," but we give it space as showing that quite an excitement prevails in that Territory over the new discovery: "There is great excitement throughout Western Montana over the rich mineral discoveries in the Coeur d'Alene mountains. Miners and prospectors who have returned state that there has been nothing in the history of the Western States and Territories equal in richness and volume to the newly discovered field. The minerals consist of silver, tellurium and free milling gold. One hundred dollars per day is being out from the rim rock of the gulches, while in the gulches \$25 to \$40 per day per day is being panned out. The streams are in the northern part of Idaho, near Eagle City, 40 miles from here on the Northern Pacific railroad. There are now about 500 people in the camp."—C. Vidette.
