Hallett-Lindsay.

On Wednesday evening the home of C. E. Butler, on Normal Hill was the scene of one of the most artistic and elegant weddings that ever occurred in Lewiston. It was the occasion of the marriage of Fred N. Hallett and Della Lindsay. The double parlors of the elegant residence were artistically decorated with holly, mistletoe and English ivy. In the arch of the great bay window on the west was a dais where on a bed of arbor vitae rested two satin pillows. Above from the corners of the window festoons of white satin ribbon were draped to the center and held directly over the dais by a snow-white dove. Banks of potted palms and Maiden Hair ferns completed the decorations.

The guests were received in the south parlor to await the coming of the wedding party. Shortly after 8 o'clock Miss Pearl Wickersham sounded the opening chords of the beautiful Mendelssohn Wedding march and the wedding party moved from the upper hall down the broad stairway through the open door to the raised platform. The clergyman, Rev. J. D. McConkey, preceded the party to his station, then followed the bridegroom with the groomsmen, Thos. Lindsay. Next the bridesmaid, Miss Edna Baird, and then the bride leaning on her father's arm.

The bride was radiantly beautiful. Over a gown of white satin she wore an overdress of chiffon effectively draped. In her hand she carried Bride's roses and in her hair were white hyacinths. An elegant bridal veil completed her costume. The bridesmaid was gowned in cream silk trimmed with pink ribbons and she carried pink roses.

The ceremony was the beautiful and impressive ring ceremony of the Episcopal service with responses. The father gave the bride away.

After a few minutes allotted to receiving congratulations the company repaired to the dining room where an elegant luncheon was spread for the occasion. The table was decorated with ivy and ferns. The center piece was a bank of chrysanthemums and above this suspended from the ceiling, by broad satin ribbons was the bride's cake resting on a tray banked with ferns.

In the midst of the merry making the First Regimental band appeared and rendered a few delightful selections. Soon after ten the party broke up and the newly married couple proceeded to the Steamer Lewiston and on the following morning went to Spokane where they will remain over the New Year.

Mt. Idaho Stage Held Up.

The stage which left Lewiston last Tuesday at noon was held up at 9 o'clock Wednesday night one mile this side of Grangeville. There were two passengers, a traveling man and a miner. The night was very dark but the flash of two rifles and the command to halt made the fact apparent that at least two desperate highwaymen were present. The driver and passengers were ordered to line up on the ground with the muzzle of a gun unpleasantly near. As they stood in line one of the robbers searched the pockets of the passengers and driver. They secured about \$25 from the miner whose name is Garber. The drummer was diligently searched from overcoat to pants but \$80 in currency in a small vest pocket was overlooked by the robbers. They found only a few cents in silver in the drummer's pockets. The driver, Allie Vincent, was also searched. The robber who was assigned to the work of searching the pockets hesitated when he came to the driver. His companion cursed him and accused him of cowardice when he faltered. After the passengers were searched the mail received attention. A leather sack was found in the boot and the robbers evidently supposed it to be the register pouch. It happened however that there were several leather sacks and the one selected did not contain the registers. The sack was split open but nothing of value was found in it. The passengers and driver after all the booty in sight was appropriated, were ordered to take their seats. The driver was ordered to turn back on the road and return to Denver upon pain of being shot. The command was obeyed so far as turning back was concerned, but after proceeding 200 yards the stage was again turned toward Grangeville whence it proceeded without molestation.

The particulars, so far as gathered, indicate the presence of two highwaymen. They were masked in gunny sacks and had horses hitched near the scene of the robbery. The tracks in the mud indicated that the robbers rode into Grangeville in advance of the stage. One of the robbers was tall and the other short. The tall man was exceedingly nervous and he went about his assigned duties in silence. The short man talked a great deal and ordered his companion about as a master would order a slave. The sheriff and a posse were upon the ground early Wednesday morning, and it is believed the robbers will be located soon.

A Favorable Report.

E. Barrow, electrical engineer and professor in charge of that department at Pullman, went with Pres. D. M. White of the Lewiston Light Co. to inspect the site of the power plant proposed by the company in making improvements in their service for next year. Prof. Barrow was seen by the TELLER after his return and gives it as his opinion that the proposed plan is perfectly feasible. It will be easy at a comparatively low cost to get a plant on Asotin creek to develop 1000 horsepower. The transmission to Lewiston will be a simple engineering problem. About ten percent of the power only will be lost by the transmission.

Prof. Barrow examined the present plant and is confident that a complete new plant can be put in fitted with the latest of modern apparatus and operated with an increase of efficiency and a decrease of cost that would pay double interest on the outlay of the investment. He was present Tuesday evening at a full meeting of the board of stockholders and gave in detail his observations and suggestions. He will draw up plans and make estimates for operating a plant that will supply light and power to Lewiston sufficient for present needs and allowing for the natural growth.

A Legal Complication.

A very interesting legal complication has arisen in the case of the United States vs Wm Jonas charged with introducing liquor on the reservation. Jonas had a hearing before Commissioner E. O'Neill and was held to appear before the federal court at the next term at Moscow. His attorney applied to Judge Piper of the state district court for a writ of habeas corpus which was granted and a hearing ordered forthwith. The point at issue is the apparent conflict between state and federal courts as to a question of jurisdiction. Has the state court the authority to issue a writ of habeas corpus in the case of a prisoner held by the authority of the United States?

Work to Begin at Once.

Nothing occurs to stop the progress of preliminaries in connection with the railroad matters. The committee in charge have completed all negotiations with the property owners and will this week have all the deeds placed safely in escrow. Engineer Van Arsdal left yesterday for Juliaetta to give instructions to the party of field surveyors that will be there to take the field at once. He had wired headquarters Wednesday that everything had been settled as far as right-of-way was concerned. Dirt will fly shortly after the New Year and the work will be pushed rapidly.
