DEMOCRATS COMPLETE WORK AT JUNEAU

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] Juneau, May 26.—The democratic convention completed its work last night by the election of the following delegates to the national convention:

A. P. Swineford, Ketchikan; L. L. Williams, Juneau; W. E. Crews, Juneau; John W. Troy, Skagway; George Murphy, Nome; Frank Bach, Douglas. The following were named alternates: C. D. Rogers, Juneau; J. Y. Ostrander, Valdez; John H. Duckworth, Treadwell; Phil Abrahams, Skagway; S. B. Agnew, Ketchikan; Joseph Sullivan, Nome.

The only contest was between George Murphy and James E. Fenton, of Nome. Both of these were elected delegates at a convention held at Nome last fall, but a fight was made against the allotment of two delegates to that place. When it was decided to give it but one, there

was a contest between Murphy and Fenton, and the former won out, though he was absent and Fenton present.

The following were named as the territorial committee:

E. J. Shaw, W. W. Casey, C. D. Rogers, T. J. Donahoe, T. C. McHugh, F. Bach, John H. Duckworth and A. J. Daly.

The platform reaffirms the principles of democracy and local self-government, asks for territorial government, condemns the government of carpet-baggers, commends and endorses the candidacy of Alton B. Parker, invokes the unit rule upon the St. Louis delegation, but does not instruct beyond demanding the nomination of a conservative democrat.

Judge A. K. Delany was permanent chairman of the convention and endorsed for national committeeman.

LOOKS BAD FOR JAPS

Rumors indicate Gen. Kuroki's army to be in dangerous situation and possibly crushingly defeated

Chefoo, May 26.—There is a startling rumor being given credence here, though it is not confirmed, that the south wing of the Japanese army of Gen. Kuroki has met disastrous defeat in which the loss in killed, wounded and prisoners was not less than 15,000 men. Newspaper correspondents here believe Gen. Kuroki's army is in a very dangerous position.

GEN. KUROKI APPEARS TO BE IN TROUBLE

St. Petersburg, May 26.—There are indications that Gen. Kuropatkin is preparing to make a very important movement against the enemy. One reason for this belief is the restrictions imposed upon war correspondents at the front. The prevailing belief is that Gen. Kuroki of the Japanese army is in great difficulties.

FEELING COMFORTABLE AT ST. PETERSBURG

St. Petersburg, May 26.—There is much comfort being taken here from the news of the recovery of Anju by the Russians. Anju was deserted weeks ago before the advance of the Japanese army. Its retaking now is taken to mean that the Japanese advance was too rapid for their own good and the Russians have rounded in their army a sufficient force to render the position of the Japanese forces at the front extremely perilous.

MAY HAVE CAPTURED CRUISERS

Paris, May 26.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of Matin says: "It is persistently rumored here that the Vladivostok squadron has captured the three cruisers bought by Japan from Chili."

JAPANESE WHIP COSSACKS

Tokio, May 26.—Gen. Kuroki reports that a section of Japanese infantry encountered and defeated 1000 Cossacks eight miles northeast of Kuangtien. The Cossacks fled leaving 20 dead on the field. The Japanese sustained no loss.
