

T.C. POWELL REMOVED FROM NOME MARSHALSHIP

President Roosevelt Summarily Disposes of Newly Appointed Oregonian—Order of Removal to Intercept Him

(Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.) Washington, April 5.—It is reported here on good authority that a message has been sent to Fairbanks removing T. C. Powell, recently appointed United States marshal for Nome, from office. Powell is now en route to Nome for which place he left Portland, Oregon, several weeks ago. The report is that the message, terminating his official career, will be handed to the newly appointed man as soon as he shall have arrived at Fairbanks. Powell is charged with being connected with grave election frauds in Portland, Oregon, where his home is and from where he was appointed upon the recommendation of Senator Fulton.

GOV. BRADY MUST ACT

Governor of Alaska asked to resign of office or get out of promoting business. Second demand is made by wire and immediate action is demanded.

Washington, April 5.—Secretary Hitchcock, of the interior department, wired Gov. Brady, of Alaska, yesterday afternoon ordering him to resign the governorship of Alaska or to retire immediately from the position of promoter of the Reynolds-Alaska Development Company. Gov. Brady must reply at once or he will be fired from his position.

This is the second demand that has been made upon Gov. Brady to get out of the promoting business or the governorship. The first one was made by mail some time ago. No attention was paid to it by the governor. Secretary Hitchcock is provoked and he will insist upon immediate action.

The action of Secretary Hitchcock was directed by the president.

The foregoing figures tell the tale of yesterday's balloting. The most marked feature of the contest was the scarcity of the votes that were polled. This was due to two facts, the absence of a contest and the inclement weather. There were 176 votes polled. Of these 11 were by women, who voted only for school directors. The disparity between the votes of the councilmen indicate that there was some scratching done and that many people went to the polls to vote for only one or two persons. About a score of "plumpers" were cast for E. J. Shaw. The utmost of good nature prevailed throughout the day.

Several voters made use of the opportunity afforded to compliment their friends, and a few scattering votes was the result. W. C. Blanchard, for school treasurer, received more votes than any other candidate for office. E. J. Shaw headed the poll for councilman, receiving five votes more than were received by W. B. King.

Under the new law the officers of election issue certificates of election to the newly elected councilmen. That done the latter may take the oath of office at once and assume the duties of their newly acquired positions. The members of the council and the school board have not decided when they will organize. It was the general opinion there would not be a council meeting until next Monday night.

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MALONY WINS

Open Town Ticket Carries Juneau in a Walk

(Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.) Juneau, April 5.—The Citizens', or "open town", ticket carried the election here yesterday in a walk, electing all of its candidates to the city council. There were 434 votes cast and John F. Malony, the lowest man on the Citizens' ticket, defeated John Reek, the highest man on the "Peoples" or "closed town" ticket by 84 majority. The result of the election is regarded as a strong endorsement of a liberal municipal policy. There was no opposition to the old school board. It was unanimously re-elected.

DEMOCRATS WIN CHICAGO ELECTION

Judge Edward J. Dunne Is Elected Mayor of Windy City By a Large Plurality. Result Is a Victory For Municipal Ownership

Dunne, the democratic nominee for mayor, was elected over Judge John M. Harlan, the republican, by 24,248 plurality. The democratic platform demands that the municipality at once take possession of the street car lines of the city and operate them in the interest of the public.

Large Funeral Last Night for S. T. Josselyn

The Masonic funeral services for S. T. Josselyn were largely attended last night. Nearly every Mason in the town was at Peoples' undertaking parlors and many other friends of the deceased were present.

The funeral took place at 8 o'clock and all the members of the Masonic order in Skagway marched to the dock with the casket containing the body of their dead brother. The remains were sent away on the Dolphin. This was in accordance with the desire of the family, as conveyed in a telegram from I. W. Dudley, agent for the W. P. & Y. R. at Seattle to W. B. King, which was received last. The pallbearers were H. R. Simpson, J. N. Wheeler, C. Olsen, J. A. Nettles, T. J. Standish and H. L. Johnson.

There will probably be a Masonic funeral at Seattle. The Masons of this city have notified those at Seattle of the death and that the body is being shipped south on the Dolphin.

The sudden death of S. T. Josselyn has shocked the city more than anything else that has occurred in a long time. He was very popular in this city. His sterling character had impressed itself upon the community and his genial good nature had made many friends for him.

Mr. Josselyn was about 65 years of age at the time of his death and he had lived a useful and busy life. He was a veteran of the civil war, quitting the service as a captain in the army of the Union.
