NEW HARBOR BOAT UP

FROM FT. SEWARD TODAY

The Captain James Fornance, the new harbor boat that is replacing the Peterson at Fort Seward, arrived here today with a bunch of officers and enlisted men from the Post.

The Fornance is a much larger and more powerful boat than the Peterson and was brought up last week from Seattle by Captain Bergman and Pilot Call.

The Fornance is almost one hundred feet in length and was built for a mine layer and used as such during the war. While her passenger accommodations are not as good as the Peterson's, it is said that a new house will be built on her and then she will be an ideal boat for these northern waters.

Captain Stidham will still be in command and that in itself is guarantee that the service will be first class all the time.

CORDOVA WANTS MUSEUM

OF FINE ARTS AND ALSO

A GOOD PUBLIC LIBRARY

There is a lively local sentiment in favor of the establishment of a public library in Cordova this year—at least the beginning of one. Rev. Eustace P. Ziegler, in reply to an inquiry, said he believed the people were earnestly desirous of having not only a good public library, together with all the leading magazines, but also a museum of fine arts to which he would be pleased to contribute. It is also believed that Sydney Laurence and other artists would be glad to contribute. Some constructive action along this line may be expected soon. Mr. Ziegler said these were questions which probably would be taken up by the Literary Club, through the initiative of one of its live-wire members.

A little further inquiry elicited the apparent consensus of opinion that the Alaska Pioneer Spirit, which is very active here, would not favor obtaining a library by endowment, or Carnegie fund, nor by charitable donation of any kind. To the contrary, it was said, the modest beginning could be made this year and additions be provided as fast as means allow. The idea seems to be to keep the city independent in this respect, free from debt and self-reliant.—Cordova Times.

At Oberammergau, 1922

The history and significance of the decennial production of the Passion Play at Oberammergau is well known.
