Speculation Over New Postmaster at Rockland Rockland, Me., Nov. 20.—Political interest in this city just now is centered upon a rather unique situation in regard to the postmastership. The term of John L. Donohue expires the coming month, and it is taken for granted by the Democratic leaders that President Wilson will reappoint him. Whether a Republican Senate will confirm that appointment is the question at issue.

The late D. M. Murphy, who was selected for the office from a field of eight candidates, died when his term was half completed, and Mr. Donohue, who was named as his successor, received a commission for four years.

An active Republican candidate for postmaster has appeared in the person of Ex-Mayor G. H. Blithen, who seems to have the field entirely to himself, and who is said to have received the indorsement of practically all the committeemen and influential leaders. His claim to the appointment, assuming that a Republican may be appointed, is not questioned by those who know of the remarkable and systematic campaign which he has inaugurated last spring when with his party in the hopeless minority, such a battle seemed little more than a useless waste of time.

Candidate Blithen was born in this city April 2, 1855. He was in the John Blithen, who was widely known in the granite centers of New England. Rodgers, dividing his time between the Clark Island plant and the New York office.
