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The Lutheran Synod.

The Lutheran Synod resumed its sessions at St. Paul's Church this morning, with Rev. Dr. Demer presiding. The minutes of the Synod are as follows: Rev. S. Demer, of St. Paul's, president; Rev. Victor Muller, of Leistersburg, Md., secretary; and W. H. James, of the First Lutheran Church of Baltimore, treasurer.

Dr. Diehl gave notice that at the next annual meeting of the Synod a motion would be made to alter section 8, chapter 1, of the Constitution to read as follows: "Ministers from other Lutheran Synods, who may be present, can be received as advisory members, and when thus received, have liberty to speak, but no vote."

Reports were received from the directors of the Theological Seminary, the auditing committee on the treasurer's report, and the visitor to Harperstown Female Seminary. An appropriation of \$380 was made for the Brooklyn Mission.

He has not seen Mr. Seville, and has not been retained. In regard to the case he says: "He should be fairly tried under the law, and if the evidence establishes his insanity, he should be confined for life, securely, where he could injure no one. Of course, if the attempt to establish his insanity is unsuccessful, he should receive the full punishment meted out by law. A fair trial of this assassin in the present excited state of public feeling would be a more successful test of the value and permanence of American institutions than any other which can be conceived."

Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the M. E. Church. The quarterly meeting of the Baltimore branch of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the M. E. Church was held at the Fayette-street M. E. Church, Baltimore, yesterday. The society consists of Mary-land, portions of Delaware and Virginia, and the District of Columbia. A Persecuted Reformer. The old missionary named John Whiteford has been twice assaulted this week by gangs of ruffians headed by Patrick Sullivan. During the first assault Sullivan struck Mr. Whiteford on the head with a brick, splintering him with blood being the result. The second assault occurred last night, in which the persecuted missionary escaped a severe beating by taking refuge in a store at Second and H streets northeast. Sullivan and his party held him in the store until he was taken to his mission-house, which they battered with stones. A warrant is sworn out for Sullivan, and he will probably be arrested in a day or two.

A Bold Theft. An unknown colored thief appeared at the back gate of No. 709 Fomby street, this afternoon, and asked if the residents had any old bones to sell. On receiving a negative reply, he proceeded to the rear of No. 707, occupied by Mrs. Buchanan, and climbing over the fence on to a shed and then to the second-story window, from which he reached a green silk dress and other articles of clothing, and was making a hasty departure, when an alarm was given and three men started after him, but the thief made his escape by climbing over a fence and has not been seen since.

The Lynchburg Boat Race. On Sunday morning next the Columbia Boat Club will send two crews to Lynchburg, Virginia, to row on Monday in the regatta of the "Tobacco City Boat Club." The first of the four-oared crews will consist of Messrs. Nute, Kintner, W. B. Bruce and E. R. Bruce. The second will be composed of Messrs. J. S. Zeigler, W. A. Smith, C. D. Davis and James Young.

This race was to have taken place on Tuesday, the 30th of last month, but was postponed on account of the death of President Garfield. The Putomacs were killed to participate in the race, but decided not to go on this account. The Columbias send two crews. There will also be a single-oared race, in which Messrs. Harnsey and Lake will represent Washington.

Rough and Tumble Fight. A fight occurred last night at the corner of Tenth street and Louisiana between a game of cards, in which the participants were S. F. Lomas, John Donelson, Lem. Weeden and a man who gave the name of Jones. Officer Oliver arrived on the scene and found Weeden lying on the pavement, while Jones was beating him on the head. Oliver was unable to separate the combatants, and called for assistance, when Officers Jones and Harlow, and Lieut. Arnold arrived, and the men were all conveyed to the Police Court. Jones, who was Weeden struck Jones on the head. In the Police Court to-day Weeden was fined \$5 for assault and \$5 for making an affray. The other three men all forfeited collateral.

The Work of the Grand Jury To-day. The grand jury went into Court at 1:30 p. m., and returned "true bills" as follows: Martha Banks, assault with intent to kill; Edmund Smith, assault with intent to kill; Thos. Jackson, second offense of petit larceny; William Allen and Benjamin Murray, burglary and larceny; Joseph Graves, keeping a common gaming table without license.

Contemptible Thieves. Complaints have been received at the office of Maj. Brock that a number of half-grown colored men are in the habit of walking in the streets in the vicinity of a number of private and public schools in this city and stealing the lunches from very small children. The lieutenants have been instructed to use every means to break up this practice, and have all parties arrested and prosecuted for vagrancy who are caught in the act of robbing the school children.
