Reported Arrangement with Paraguay.

A British vessel from Pernambueo at this port brings adrices from Montevideo to the 25th of February. The latest dates from the River La Plata hitherto received were to the 21st of January. This vessel brings a report of the settlement of the Paraguay business, which is probable enough; but we have no details whatever as to the terms agreed upon, and even the fact of an actual arrangement does not seem so clear. The only document on the subject is a report by Gen. Urquiza, President of the Argentine Confederation, dated February 5th, and giving an account of his visit to Asuncion, whither, at the last accounts, he had gone, and of the result of his intervention as the mutual friend of both Lopez and the United States. But this, like so many other Spanish-American documents, though it contains words enough, is not quite so full, definite and distinct as might be desired in the information which it imparts. It appears that Urquiza reached Asuncion on the 16th (we suppose) of January, and found the Republic of Paraguay decidedly resolved upon "an heroic resistance," for which a considerable concentration of military means had been made. It would seem that, subsequently, President Urquiza paid a visit to Commissioner Bowlin and, along with the Plenipotentiary of Brazil offered the mediation of Brazil and the Argentine Confederation, though the place where and the time when, are not stated. Mr. Bowlin was found very well disposed toward a pacific arrangement, but declared that his instructions would not allow him to accept the mediation proposed. Yet, as a proof of his conciliatory spirit, and as a mark of special consideration for President Urquiza, he agreed to accept his personal good offices and to open preparatory confidential conferences to arrange the terms of a settlement. The president refers to certain papers, annexed, giving an account of these conferences, but as these papers are not published, it does not appear by whom they were attended, or whether Paragnay was represented or not. The President speaks of himself as having assisted in the last conference, "in which the question was "decided," but this question would seem to have been not the terms of a final arrangement, but merely the basis upon which the negotiation was to proceed. 

It will not be improper to call the attention of those interested to a fact that operates much against Chicago and her trade so far as this part f the country is concerned. His allusions to the former administration of our property and the title on which it is held, I must consider as bunded on a want of correct information, and being impertinent to the present of case, pass liem over with that silence which they merit. The gentleman considers it an objection to our scheme that the property be at the hisrosat of our Bishop; and truly if such were likely to be the fact, the objection might be well-founded for many of our subscribers. But even were the property held in the Bishop's name, according to the duties of his office, he would only be its administrator, could not dispose of it at pleasure, and would be obliged to convert it to that use for which it was intended by the donor. However, I wish it to be distinctly understood, that it never was the intention of our Rt. Rev.
