Mrs. Smart Is Arrested For Speeding Auto In California

Speeding to San Jose for luncheon yesterday, H. G. Smart, husband of former Thelma Parker, the richest girl of Hawaii, was arrested, with his wife, while Fred H. Knight, his brother-in-law, in another machine, was also gathered in by County Traffic Officer Emilie Agraz, says the San Francisco Call which reached here this morning. The two big seven-passenger cars were racing along just on the San Jose side of the Alameda county line when the drivers were arrested. Both drivers will appear before Justice of the Peace F. B. Brown at San Jose Tuesday morning.

According to the report made by the arresting officer, Smart was eloping, and Knight, his father-in-law, was chasing him when the officer held them up.

Smart is a young Virginian who went to Honolulu a year ago and was married to Miss Parker. After a short honeymoon in Hawaii the young couple came to San Francisco and have been living at the Bellevue.

At the time of her marriage Mrs. Smart was provided by her guardian and the managers of the ranch, Alfred

Carter, with an income of \$12,000 a year, so that the high cost of living does not worry the young couple.

Tighter Skirts For Fashionable 1913

Again the creators of fashion have decreed that the skirt for the fashionable women of 1913 are to be narrower than ever. For some women it will be rather a difficult task to make them any narrower than they have been this winter.

Dame Fashion who is at present carrying the name de plume of Ann Ritzenhouse, Worth, Drecol, and several others just as attractive, and authoritative, says that the street skirts are to be a little longer than they were last spring but they will not be too long. They must be buttoned in the front. The width around the bottom is to be so narrow that many of them will have to be slashed so that the wearer may walk with comfort.

An illustration of this mode was brought to Honolulu the other day by a lady who was passing through on one of the large boats. Her model was rather too exaggerated for Honoluluans as it was slit about a foot from the bottom both at the front and back of the skirt. Ann Ritzenhouse suggests that these slashes be hidden with false plaits.

There is to be a decided change in the waists. They are to say the least, be high at the back and low at the front, and the sleeves will be very long with long lace ruffles at the wrist.

When speaking of the evening gowns, Miss Ritzenhouse says that they must have an oriental slash in the front. The majority of them will have the long narrow train that gives the wearer a graceful appearance.

The young girl will wear evening gowns that the extremely narrow at the bottom and the draperies over the hips will give her very straight lines.

These fashions will be very pretty and graceful and will no doubt be adopted in Hawaii as well as in the east but they will give the wearer no comfort. One of the reasons for this is that the Honolulu women will not wear the slits and slashes in their skirts but will in all probability wear the ultra narrow models.

Gradually most of the Honolulu women are coming out of their very conventional shells and are adopting the fads and fancies of their sisters in the east but there are still a number of little things that have not merited their full approval. One of these is the cut skirt. Some years ago when the Directorate ladies wore a beehive-shaped slash at the lower left side of their skirts Honolulu's society women snoot their heads in grave disapproval and though they wore a semi-directoire skirt none of them were ultra fashionable. It is not unlikely then that they will feel the same towards the new skirt.

For more than a year the skirts have been almost straight and the women and girls have tried to adopt the straight lines. Many of them have failed miserably in the attempt however for in their eagerness to have the skirts straight and narrow they have made them decidedly narrow but without the straight line.

The two types who have done this are the young girl and the stout woman. Of course it has been rather hard for a stout woman to have a gown both straight and narrow and as she could not have both she selected the latter.

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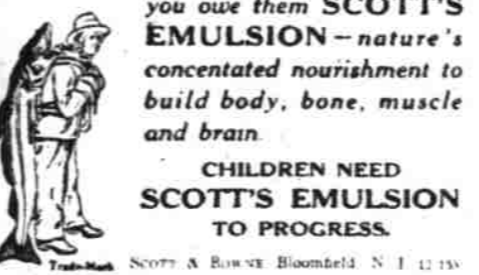


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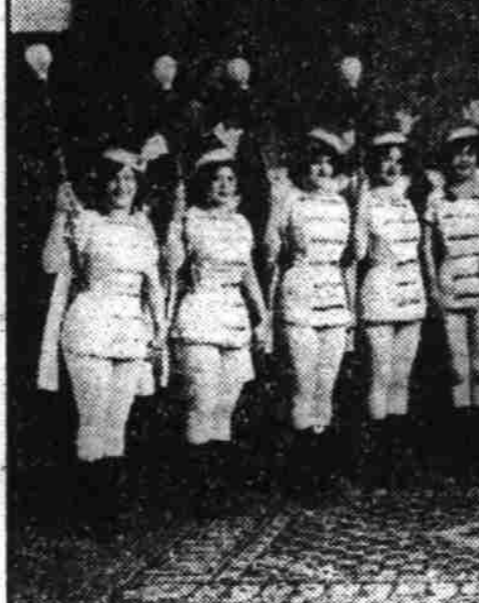
