Cognizant of a widespread public sentiment that a prompt decision was much to be desired in the interest of the general industrial and financial conditions in the country, the Interstate Commerce Commission at once assigned the application - officially designated the Eastern Advance Rate Case-for public hearings. Chairman Harlan in person conducted some and examiners took testimony at others, at which representatives of the railroads and shippers had opportunity to testify under oath and to swear and examine witnesses.

The fifty-two railroad systems concerned presented their case principally by President Daniel Willard of the Baltimore & Ohio system, President Delano of the Monon system, and George Stewart Patterson, general counsel for the Pennsylvania. Many other prominent railroad executives appeared and gave testimony during the course of the hearings, however, among the President Rea of the Pennsylvania, President Smith of the New York Central system and officials of all the principal systems con-
