## CARRANZA AND VILLA ARE STILL AT VARIANCE

[Associated Press by Fed. Wireless.]  
EL PASO, August 2.—General Carranza, who has been busy fortifying his position at Chihuahua, and recruiting up his army at the rate of about four hundred men daily, announced yesterday that he would take part in the entrance of Constitutional President Carranza into the City of Mexico.

The differences between Villa and his former chief have not been satisfactorily adjusted, and Villa intends to accompany Carranza into the City of Mexico, although he has pointedly not been sent any invitation. A clash between the two leaders and their followers is feared if mutual understanding is not reached when Provisional President Carranza turns the reins of office over to Carranza. It is now deemed probable that Villa will endeavor to prevent Carranza assuming the office of President of Mexico on account of their recent troubles. Villa is believed to entertain the design of making General Angeles the President.

## CAPTAIN HENRI BERGER ADDS ANOTHER MEDAL TO COLLECTION

Birthday of Veteran Leader Is Commemorated by Large Throng at the Capitol

A new gold medal glitters on the breast of Captain Henri Berger today. Placed there yesterday afternoon by Queen Liliuokalani, on the occasion of the kappelmester's 70th birthday, it is now one of the proudest possessions of the veteran band leader.

Impressive services were held yesterday afternoon in the capitol grounds to commemorate the birthday of Captain Henri Berger, and to give expression of the universal respect and affection in which he is held.

At the close of the services he was presented with a golden baton from the members of the band. The presentation was made by Governor Pinkham, who delivered an address in which he briefly sketched the career of the musician and closed with a reference to patriotism.

"Though the Bible," said the chief executive in conclusion, "gives us on only three score years and ten to expect on this earth, you promise to be an exception; and in presenting you with this baton as a token of affection from your musicians, it is with the hope that you may still long lead them, and inspire the National Guard of Hawaii and the citizens of Hawaii, whose loyalty no one but the Almighty knows how soon may be put to the test. Aloha nui."

Judge Dole had prepared a splendid address on the influence of music on the people, which was read by Miss Thelma Murphy. Mayor Fern spoke briefly on the fruitful life of the captain.

The honor of pinning the gold medal on the kappelmester's breast fell to Queen Liliuokalani. When this had been accomplished, the aged captain, escorted the queen to her chair, and as he bowed and kissed her hand in token of fealty and affection, a wave of applause swept across the capitol grounds.

The services were held in the band stand which had been elaborately decorated with flags for the occasion. The program opened with a concert. Before it was over, Queen Liliuokalani, Governor Pinkham, Judge S. B. Dole, Mayor Fern, Captain J. D. Dougherty of the governor's staff and Lieuts. W.

## INCREASE IN FREIGHT RATES ALLOWED BY INTERSTATE COURT

WASHINGTON, August 3.—The Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday rendered a divided opinion in the case of fifty-two railroads who had applied for permission to raise their freight rates. The lines in question operate in the territory east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers. They had asked for a five per cent increase. This is just half the increase which the same railroads tried to get approval of in 1910, but failed.

The decision yesterday grants the five per cent increase to some of the railroads, denying others. These will apply to territory north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers from vertical lines drawn through Buffalo and Pittsburgh west as far as the Mississippi river.

Commissioners Daniels and McChord dissented on the ground that the increase should have been general.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 3.—The general movement of the eastern railroads to increase their freight rates in the territory east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers was the second within the decade. The first application to the Interstate Commerce Commission which asked for a ten per cent increase, was denied in 1910. No further concerted move was made by the railroads until last year when the application for a five per cent increase was made. It was practically identical with the application of four years previous except that the advances asked were only half as much.

Cognizant of a widespread public sentiment that a prompt decision was much to be desired in the interest of the general industrial and financial conditions in the country, the Interstate Commerce Commission at once assigned the application—officially designated the Eastern Advance Rate Case—for public hearings. Chairman Harlan in person conducted some and examiners took testimony at others, at which representatives of the railroads and shippers had opportunity to testify under oath and to swear and examine witnesses.

The fifty-two railroad systems concerned presented their case principally by President Daniel Willard of the Baltimore & Ohio system, President Delano of the Monon system, and George Stewart Patterson, general counsel for the Pennsylvania. Many other prominent railroad executives appeared and gave testimony during the course of the hearings, however, among the President Rea of the Pennsylvania, President Smith of the New York Central system and officials of all the principal systems concerned.

Opposition to the advance was conducted principally by Louis D. Brandeis of Boston who was engaged as counsel for the Interstate Commerce Commission and the shippers; Frank Lyon, representing the Pittsburgh coal company, one of the leading opponents of the increase, and Clifford Thorne, representing the railroad.

## OBREGON READY TO FIGHT WAY INTO CAPITAL

GUADALAJARA, Mexico, August 2.—General Obregon notified Provisional President Carranza yesterday that he will begin his march on the City of Mexico today. He has also notified the Provisional President that he is prepared to give battle if his advance is resisted.

Obregon has massed 6000 troops for the occupation of the capital and it is anticipated that President Carranza will not oppose his entry into the city.

## ROYAL ARTS SOCIETY GIVES MARCONI MEDAL

LONDON.—The Royal Society of Arts has awarded the Albert medal for the current year, the highest honor in its gift, to William Marconi, the wireless inventor. Last year's recipient was King George.
