Warships Gathering On South Pacific Coast, But May Not Meet

CRITICAL LAND AND NAVAL BATTLES ARE NOW AWAITED

GERMANY SMASHING HOLE TOWARD COAST WHILE ON EAST RUSSIA STRENGTHENS

Critics Agree Recent Developments on Russian Frontier Overshadow Battle of Flanders—Berlin Officially Says Heavy Losses Inflicted on Enemy at Nieuport—Britain to Raise Another Million—French Torpedoer Rams and Sinks German Submarine—British Losses Very Heavy, According to Official Figures—Kaiser to Sell Costly Villa

PARIS, France, Nov. 13.—The threatened German advance to the seacoast of France is blocked so long as the Allies hold Ypres, Belgium, it is argued by the military experts of the Allies.

They declare that while they retain Ypres, the Germans cannot advance via La Bassée and Bethune. To advance over this route, it is held, is impossible since it would expose the right flank of the Germans to a serious danger from the Allies around Ypres.

It is also held that if the Allies are able to advance from Ypres, they will immediately menace the left flank of this part of the German forces, and that the Germans would be compelled to evacuate Lille and abandon hope of reaching the coast.

The conviction grows that the German strategic offensive is nearing a close and that the war is about to enter its third phase on both the western and eastern frontiers.

Critics agree that however important the battle of Flanders is, recent developments on the Russian frontier overshadow it in importance so far as the final result of the conflict is concerned. Russia is now beginning to get all her tremendous forces into the field, bringing to bear all her effectiveness at a time when Germany is employing her third-line levies to recruit her troops. These third-line levies have had only six weeks' active training.

BERLIN DECLARES ATTACK ON YPRES IS PROGRESSING

BERLIN, Germany, Nov. 13.—Official—"At Nieuport our marines have inflicted heavy losses and captured 700 of the enemy."

"Our attacks on Ypres are progressing favorably. Another thousand prisoners have been taken there. Fierce attacks by the French east and west of Soissons have been repulsed and the enemy lost heavily in these encounters."

BRITAIN WILL RAISE ANOTHER MILLION MEN

LONDON, England, Nov. 13.—The government today introduced supplementary estimates for the raising of another million men for war. This will bring the total to 2,176,000, exclusive of the territorials.

Allies' Statement Says Fighting From Lys to Sea is Less Violent

PARIS, France, Nov. 13.—Official—"The fighting now is less violent from the river Lys to the sea. Several attempts of the Germans to debouch from Dixmude by the western outlet toward Dunkirk, across the Yser, have been checked by the Allies."

"Generally speaking, the positions of the armies are unchanged, though during the last few foggy days we have slowly progressed. We are almost everywhere within from 300 to 500 meters of the enemy's wire entanglements in front of their positions."

GERMAN AND ALLIED SHIPS MAY NOT MEET

SQUADRON OF SIX, SUPPOSEDLY
BRITISH AND JAPANESE, STEAM FAR SOUTH
OF WHERE GERMANS LAST REPORTED

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 13.—The German cruisers Leipzig and Dresden are provisioning here.

The Port Corral lighthouse keeper, 475 miles south, last Wednesday sighted six warships, steaming south. He could not identify them.

Four warships were sighted off Talcahuano, several hundred miles north of Valparaiso, according to reports Wednesday. They were steaming north. This morning's despatches said that a Japanese squadron was sighted 200 miles south of Valparaiso. If all the reports are correct, the Anglo-Japanese fleet sent out to meet the Germans is probably far south of the latter. The German vessels are probably the Scharnhorst, Gneisenau, Murnberg and Bremen, since the Leipzig and Dresden are reported today at Valparaiso.

GOOD BONDS ARE NOW ON SALE BY THE TREASURER

Governor Pinkham Ridicules
Suggestion of Any Question
of Their Legality

WILL SELL SAFE, SANE
4 PER CENT SECURITIES

Colonel McCarthy Simply Has
to Deliver the Papers and
Receive the Coin

In 33 bundles the new territorial bonds arrived from the East on the Matsonia Tuesday and now are on sale at the territorial treasurer's office. Col. McCarthy makes the announcement today that any one desiring to invest in absolutely solid, safe, 4 per cent securities may do so by making their deposit over the counter at his office and receiving the bonds, with the usual interest coupons attached and no further legal formalities required.

The \$60,000 worth bought by local investors several weeks ago, when the issue was first placed on sale, will be delivered to the purchasers within the next day or two, and the recent sales of \$20,000 and \$30,000 worth successfully negotiated by Superintendent C. R. Forbes of Kauai will be completed at once by exchange of the paper for the coin.

"There isn't a shadow of suspicion on the legality of the bonds," declared the governor today, "even though D. L. Conkling, who prepared them, is no longer treasurer."

"The only question raised on the point: that the delivery of the bonds should be made by the treasurer who caused them to be made, has no foundation in law and certainly none in reason. It is not legally necessary that Conkling should be the man to make the delivery of every lot of the bonds which may be sold. Attorney-general Stainback has rendered an opinion to that effect, and there is no law here or elsewhere demanding such ridiculous procedure."

All Treasurer McCarthy has to do in connection with the flotation is to receive payment and deliver the paper to purchasers. The issue is complete, every bond is duly signed by Conkling and Henry C. Hapal, and the new treasurer is not called upon to touch a pen to them.

SCHOONER OF MYSTERY MAY BE A PEARLER

Treasure hunter, pearler or adventurer? The mission of Captain G. R. Frai and his little company on board the diminutive schooner Jessie Fremont, which was brought to a berth at quarantine wharf this afternoon, is yet a mystery to federal officials who visited the ancient craft, following its long passage from San Diego, Cal.

Declaring that he had been despatched on a pearling expedition by Los Angeles capitalists, Captain Frai today named L. A. Blackman, said to be at the head of the Second National Bank of Los Angeles, as the one who contributed the larger share toward financing the trip.

Sailing from San Diego on September 28, the little schooner fell in with very rough weather which continues for several weeks, during which time the Jessie Fremont, built in the year 1858, lost some sails and began to take considerable water.

Report Gen. T. H. Bliss Will
Get Murray's Vacancy When
Scott Becomes Chief

DESPATCH ON "MOBILE
DIVISION" IS NOT CLEAR

Imminent Army Promotions
Told of in Wireless From
Washington

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—Brig.-gen. Hugh L. Scott, at present assistant to the chief of staff, will be appointed chief of staff on the retirement for age of Maj.-gen. W. W. Wetherapoon next Monday. Scott will be made a major-general, getting the vacancy created by Wetherapoon's retirement.

It was announced today that Brig.-gen. T. H. Bliss would become chief of the mobile division of the army on the retirement of Maj.-gen. Arthur Murray, April 29, 1915.

The reference to Gen. Bliss becoming "chief of the mobile division of the army" on Gen. Murray's retirement is not understood by army officials here. The assistant chief of staff, a brigadier-general, usually has general charge of the mobile forces in an advisory capacity. The reference to Gen. Murray is taken to mean that Gen. Bliss will get his vacancy, and become a major-general in April. This will mean passing two men over the head of Brig.-gen. Funston, who has been skipped for years in the line of promotion. It was generally understood that Scott was to be made the next chief of staff, but that Murray's vacancy had been promised to Funston.

ESTIMATES 5000 PRISONERS TAKEN BY THE JAPANESE

MOTHER CLINGS TO LIFELESS FORM OF HER INFANT SON

Weeping bitterly and clinging to the lifeless form of her babe the mother of Taso Kogima, a year-old Japanese boy, refused to allow the lifeless child to part from her until the police had been called upon to aid the board of health authorities yesterday afternoon.

In a puddle of water about two feet in depth that had collected at the intersection of Aloha lane and King street the child was discovered dead and removed to its home where the mother, overcome with grief, insisted that she would never part from her babe. Upon the health authorities calling the police considerable difficulty was experienced in persuading the mother to allow the child to be removed to the morgue.

Coroner Julius Asch announced today that no inquest would be held over the dead infant, the testimony of eye-witnesses being to the effect that the boy had been left to play in the vicinity of the pool during the absence of his parents, had fallen in and met his death.

4 GERMAN AEROPLANES LURED OVER ALLIES AND DESTROYED

YPRES, Belgium, Nov. 13.—Two British and two French aeroplanes have won an important aerial victory over a squadron of German machines. The Allies' aviators lured four German aeroplanes over the positions of some masked artillery of the Allies and the fire of shrapnel from the Allies brought down the German machines.

FRENCH TORPEDOER RAMS; SINKS GERMAN SUBMARINE

DUNKIRK, France, Nov. 13.—A French torpedoer has rammed and sunk a German submarine off Westende. A great smear of oil showed where the submarine sank. The damage to the torpedoer was trivial.

British Casualties Are Heavy; One Man in Every Six is Lost

LONDON, England, Nov. 13.—Premier Asquith stated in Parliament today that the British casualties were about 57,000 up to October 31, including all ranks. Lord Kitchener recently stated that Britain had 300,000 men in the field. Therefore Britain's loss is approximately one man in every six, counting as casualties the killed, wounded and missing.

Kaiser Would Sell Villa, Fearing Greece May Join Allies And Take It

GENEVA, Switzerland, Nov. 13.—The Kaiser has offered for sale the villa of Achillion, on the island of Corfu, built in 1890 for the Empress Elisabeth of Austria at a cost of \$5,000,000. Since then it has been extensively enlarged. It is reported that the Kaiser fears that the villa will be confiscated if Greece joins the Allies.

WAR RELIEF FUND OF CHAMBER IS NEARING THE \$25,000 MARK

The Chamber of Commerce to date has received \$22,700 in contributions toward the relief of the widows and orphans in Belgium. From all parts of Honolulu, and from the other islands, donations are coming in in large numbers, the amounts ranging from \$5 to \$1000.

WELSH-MCFARLAND BOUT LIKELY TO BE HELD IN NEW YORK NEXT YEAR
