"A decrease in Lutheran churches of nearly 1000 may be attributed largely to the same cause. There is good reason to believe that the Disciples of Christ had a good year in 1915, but unfortunately they were not able to report any figures for the past year, up to January 22, and those of 1914 are used. The apparent loss of over 11,000 members and 150 churches by the Cumberland Presbyterians is probably to be accounted for by more accurate returns.

"The fact that the grand total show." an actual loss instead of the usual net gain of more than 150 churches is worthy of careful study. One large body, the Southern Baptists, reports neither gain nor loss of churches, and yet it had an increase of communicants of over 116,000. Probably the closing or consolidation of rural churches is an important factor.

ON THE BIRDS ALL **HUMAN LIFE HANGS**

Do you want to know the one thing that can be worse than the European war? John Davey, big brother to the Lirds and tree physician, Kent. Ohio's arbiter of lawn and stream, has found out what it is.

Mr. Davey tells an audience each right at the West Side Y. M. C. A.: "Human life depends upon vegetation. We would all starve if vegetation ceased for a year. But vegetation depends upon the birds, who protect it from destruction by insects. "Human life, therefore, depends upon the birds. All insectivorous birds in this country are decreasing 10 per cent each year. Unless we start at ence to increase their number, to protect them and kill their enemies. within a decade will occur the disaster to humanity which I have spoken of-a catastrophic borror more awful than the European war."

Decrease in the insectivorous birds, said Mr. Davey, is due to destruction of forests, depriving birds of retreats from storms and cold, and the enmity of the English sparrows, who, he said. increase almost as fast as the ton measured progeny of the canker worm.


GREAT ENGLISH ESTATES MAY BE BROKEN BY WAR

LONDON, Eng.—One of the results of the war, according to reliable information, will be the adoption by the government of a big scheme of land purchase for England such as has been so successful in Ireland.

Confronted with the two-fold problem of providing employment for discharged soldiers both during and after the war, and the desirability of increasing home-grown food supplies, the Home Office, the Board of Trade and the Board of Agriculture entered into consultation with the war office and the admiralty, and the outcome was the appointment by the Board of Agriculture of a special committee presided over by Sir Harry C. W. Ver-

The report of the committee is said to recommend extensive state acquisitions of land by compulsory purchase for the establishment on a large scale of colonies of small bolders and the development of cooperative buying and marketing and of agricultural credit banks, together with a provision for a large state grant to put the proposals into operations.
