## GREAT RACING

FOR JULY 4 AND AUG. 12.

On Wednesday evening, the Maui Racing Association met for the election of officers and the adoption of a racing program. For several years past, racing on Maui has steadily degenerated, until the mention of races at Kahului simply provokes smiles of derision. The primary reason for this has been that the purses have been whittled down to a point where it would not pay a man to fit his horse for the contests offered. Then the entries have been so limited to Maui bred horses that one could tell for weeks beforehand just what particular horse was to take what particular purse. Of course this would kill racing, and it has done so, effectually and deservedly. In the meantime Hilo has forged ahead and preempted the Fourth of July as racing day.

Nothing can save racing on Maui except new blood in the management and larger purses to contend for, and the Association rose to the situation at their meeting. Hon. A. N. Kepoikai was reelected president, as he is fully in accord with more liberal and progressive management of racing matters. Mr. W. L. Decoto of Lahaina was elected vice-president. For secretary, Mr. D. L. Meyer and Mr. T. B. Lyons were nominated, and Mr. D. L. Meyer was elected by a majority of one vote. Mr. Jas. L. Coke was elected Treasurer, and the following were named as the executive committee: W. T. Robinson, M. L. Decker, and L. M. Baldwin. As the real success of the races will depend upon the manner in which the executive committee does its work, the Association is to be congratulated on the selection of these gentlemen. There was some good-natured "knocking" over the general result of the election, by the younger members, but when they come to understand clearly what line of policy is marked out by the selection of present officers, there is no doubt that the young gentlemen will wheel into line and stand for good racing.

The next matter for consideration was the adoption of a racing program, and the fixing of dates. For the Fourth of July it was decided that local racing for small purses should be given for the benefit of home talent, without offering anything to attract from the Hilo races, and with but little discussion, the following program was adopted for the races on the Fourth.

1. Foot Race, 100 yards. Amateurs. \$10 00
2. Bicycle Race, free for all, Ent. \$2.50, 1 mile. 25 00
3. Trotting & Pacing, Haw'n Bred, 2 in 3. 50 00
4. Pony Race, free for all, 14 hands and under 1 mile. 50 00
5. Running Race, free for all 1 mile. 75 00
6. Pony Race, free for all, 14 hands, 1 mile. 50 00
7. Trotting & Pacing, free for all, 2 in 3. 75 00
8. Running Race, free for all, 1 mile. 75 00
9. Mule Race, free for all, 1 mile. 50 00
10. Corinthian Race, 1 mile Members to ride. Medal. 40 00

Then came the more important question of giving races worthy of the name. It seemed to be the sense of the meeting that Aug. 12 should be named as the regular Maui Racing Day, but final action was postponed until the secretary could correspond with the Hilo and Honolulu Jockey Clubs and horsemen, with the view of ascertaining if they would come to Maui for good purses.

The executive committee then presented the following program of races for Aug. 12, and on motion of Mr. George H. Cummings, they were adopted as presented.

1. Trotting & Pacing, free for all, 3 in 5, 1 mile heats. \$400 00
  2. Running Race, Haw'n Bred, 1 mile dash. 100 00
  3. Running Race, free for all, 1 mile dash. 100 00
  4. Trotting & Pacing, Haw'n Bred, 2 in 3. 250 00
  5. Running Race, free for all, 1 mile dash. 300 00
  6. Pony Race, 14 hands and under, 1 mile dash. 100 00
- 4 or more to enter, and 3 to start; Entrance fee, 10 per cent. The meeting then adjourned to Thursday of next week, May 15, by which time it is hoped that communications will be received from Hilo and Honolulu.

There is no doubt but that the As-

sociation has now started on the right track, and if the members of the Association and the people of Maui support the movement, good racing may be expected.

## MONTHLY MEETING

Of Maui Athletic Association.

On Monday evening last, the regular monthly meeting of the Maui Athletic Association was held at the Wailuku Court House, and several matters of interest came up. The committee on League base ball made a report of their program and proceedings, substantially as given in last week's News. The base ball rules of 1901 were adopted as the rules of the Association.

It being the date for the election of officers for the ensuing year, the following were elected; L. M. Baldwin, President; Geo. Hons, Vice President; L. R. Crook, Secretary and Treasurer.

The following were elected as a board of directors; G. B. Schrader, Rev. W. Ault, J. Garcia, Dr. Boote and Jas. L. Coke.

W. H. Cornwell Jr. was elected Captain and Dr. R. W. Boote Manager of the Maui Athletic base ball team, and the secretary was directed to issue a challenge at once to the Hilo team, for a champion game of ball at Wailuku, June 11.

The record of the secretary and treasurer shows that the Association is out of debt, and in a healthy financial condition.

## New Polo Team Wins.

On last Saturday afternoon, the first match game of polo was played between the Makawao Polo Club and Maui Athletic Association Club, at Sunnyside, Makawao, and the M. A. A.s won with a score of three to one, and one tie.

The day had been rainy, but both sides were anxious to play, and when time was called, both teams appeared on the field. The rain ceased, and save for a wet, slippery field, the conditions were favorable. Both sides were well mounted, with something in the favor of the M. A. A.s and the boys were in fine fettle. The result was one of the fastest and best contested games ever played at Sunnyside.

In the first quarter, Cornwell took the ball and carried it down the field to a point just short of goal, where he lost it, and when time was called, the novices were still trying to put the ball through the goal but were steadily opposed and balked by their veteran opponents; result a tie. In the second, third and fourth quarters, the M. A. A. made goals, and in an extra the Makawaos made a goal.

The M. A. A.s modestly attribute their victory to the drill that their Captain, Frank Baldwin has given them in team work, and this is perhaps true, for Mr. Baldwin has taught his team to depend on team work, rather than on brilliant individual playing.

The individual play of Wilbur and Sam Kalama of the Makawaos was marked by splendid dash and vim, while the riding off of Harry Baldwin on the redoubtable little, "Tom Thumb" was a marked feature of the game. Von Tempsky played his usual steady, excellent game, without any grand stand display. He is a fine rider, especially on wet, slippery ground, which makes him a strong card in a team.

At the close of the game, the veterans greeted the victory of the novices with ringing cheers, which compliment was heartily returned by the novices. The ladies of Makawao had kindly provided refreshments for the players, and there was quite an attendance, in spite of the rain.

The two teams will play again this afternoon at Sunnyside, and at Kahului next Saturday afternoon.
