LAHAINA LINES.

A few hydrants may be seen in the business part of the town. Next in order will be a supply of hose and couplings to fit the hydrants, and a volunteer company of hremen. As Lahaina has never had a regular fire department, a regular course of instruction and discipline may be needed. The sooner the better, for no one can predict when the next fire will break out.

The proposed extension of Lahaina wharf will not be simply a local improvement, but will be helpful to Wailuku as well. Honolulu people often say that they would like to see their friends on Maui, but they have no desire to ride the surf in small boats.

It is not too soon to look forward to the time when rapid electric transit will bring East and West Maui into neighborly and harmonious relations. The literary and musical people of Lahaina and Wailuku can then unite in giving entertainments alternately on each side of the island. Local jealousy and petty rivalry should give place to friendly co-operation.

SHIPPING NEWS

It is reported that, owing to the success attained by the Korean emigrants in Hawaii who left their home last year, a scheme for the exportation of Korean workmen to the islands for the second time is now being planned by a certain American emigration agent in Seoul. The latter is said to be trying at present to raise one hundred laborers among the natives. The Korean emigrants are said to be becoming more popular in Hawaii than the Chinese.—Japan Times.

Advices by the steamer Empress of China tell of the capture of four Japanese and an American named Thompson, hunters of the Japanese sealing schooner Ishikawa Maru, at Robben Islands, the sealers being alleged to be raiders. The sealers were captured by the garrison of Cossacks on the island and taken to Vladivostok where they were sentenced to fourteen months' imprisonment.

It is probable that the Noeau will carry freight from Hilo to Hamakua when she leaves here after the wind abates. Some of the business men of Hilo are negotiating with Manager Kennedy of the Inter-Island Navigation Company to have a steamer in that line call here once a month and take cargo of merchandise to Honokaa and Kukuibaele.—Hilo Herald.

The purser of the Inter-Island steamer Mauna Loa which returned yesterday from Hawaii reports that the volcano is more or less active, tourists from there giving him this information. There has been no steam in the crater for the past week, but on February 27 considerable more fire than at any time since last November.—Advertiser.

Wireless telegraphic communication between the United States and the Philippines, via Hawaii, is promised within the next 18 months by Dr. Deforest, with whose wireless telegraph system the Navy Department has been experimenting at Annapolis.

Washington, Feb. 16.—The United States collier Alexander, with a crew of thirty-three on board, is drifting at the mercy of high wind and tides somewhere between San Juan, Porto Rico, and Norfolk, her destination.

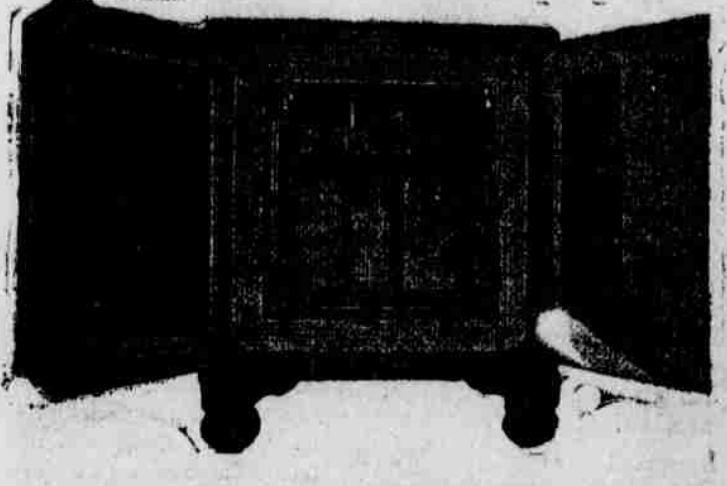
