State control of the several counties, we believe that the laws should be amended so that the income tax of corporations shall be payable in the county within which the property of the corporation is situated.

We stand for the equality of labor and capital, and we uphold the Territorial executive in the strict enforcement of the statute requiring that all labor on public works shall be performed by citizens of the United States, or those eligible to become such.

We favor the rapid opening of the public lands, and believe in the disposal thereof to bona fide settlers on the most favorable terms.

We advocate that adequate appropriation be made for the prompt surveying and plotting of all lands available for settlement. We will urge through our delegate the amendment by Congress of section 73 of the Organic Act, so as to give to our Legislature the right to amend the land laws.

The wide interest aroused for the advancement of the public schools shows that the people are alive to the necessity for the protection and development of this great factor of our American progress.

We pledge our legislative representatives to the adoption of an appropriation that will secure for the teachers of this Territory the remuneration which their training and experience justifies under the present rules and regulations of the department of public instruction. We favor the appointment of a local board of education in each county, which such board shall have full charge of the public schools in their respective counties, under and subject to such general rules and regulations as may be prescribed by the department of Public Instruction.

We favor the extension of manual training in the public schools. Hawaii has reached the point in its educational progress which warrants the establishment of a college of agriculture and mechanical arts on the same lines as the institutions found in every state and territory of the mainland under the Morrill Act, and later endorsed by the United States Congress who obtained this federal endowment. It is necessary for the Territory to take the initiative. We believe this can be best brought about by the setting aside of income producing public lands, the returns from which shall be permanently devoted to the maintenance of such college.

And we pledge our candidates to the support of and executive and legislative policy which shall bring about the desired results.

The promiscuous granting of licenses for the sale of spirituous liquors under the present statute whereby irresponsible persons are enabled to sell an inferior quality of intoxicants without discrimination to the injury of the public at large necessitates the careful revision of the liquor law. We favor the enactment of a high license law, with provision for the inspection of liquors and such other provisions as will properly safeguard the traffic and prevent its abuse.

We favor the enactment by Congress of the Refund Bill, by the terms of which 75% of the customs receipts collected in this Territory shall be expended here.

We favor the enactment of a general primary law for this Territory, under which the nomination of candidates for the legislature and elective offices shall be made directly by the voters.

We favor liberal appropriation for the maintenance of our unfortunate fellow citizens who are segregated at Kalaupapa and Kala-wao, and advocate the continuance of federal assistance in the attempt to find a cure for their malady.

We advocate a suitable emergency appropriation to be at the disposal of the Board of Health for the purpose of guarding against epidemics.

We advocate further improvement of our harbors wharfage, and

landing facilities throughout the Territory. The erection of needed public buildings and other necessary public works.

We favor a Territorial appropriation for the purpose of assisting in the maintenance of the work of the Hawaiian Promotion Committee.

We desire legislative investigation into the matter of private wharves and landings, with a view to the regulation of charges at the same, and to consider the feasibility of the acquisition thereof by the government.

We endorse the measure introduced by our delegate in Congress asking the appropriation of the sum of \$250,000 for former Queen Liliuokalani, and in the meantime favor the continuance by the legislature of the present appropriation.

We oppose and denounce all trusts, monopoly and combination of capital as they tend to control supplies, increase prices, lower wages and check the opportunities for labor.

We favor the appointment of a commission for the purpose of considering the subject of taxation, and to report at the following session of the legislature, recommending ways and means for the revision and improvement of the tax system of this Territory.

We ask the support of all voters who desire and believe in an honest, efficient and economical administration of affairs for the candidates of the Republican Party, who stand pledged to the foregoing platform.

When the chairman announced that nominations for a delegate to Congress were in order Rev. Desha of Hilo arose and addressed the convention in his native Hawaiian tongue, speaking eloquently of the work accomplished by the Delegate during the years he has been in Washington, and of his fitness for the leadership of the party. He spoke for forty-five minutes and his witty remarks brought forth many rounds of applause.

Hon. H. P. Baldwin moved that all who were in favor of Kalaniana'ole arise. This was seconded by Lovel of Kauai. The motion was carried unanimously, and as they did so they gave three cheers and a tiger for the choice of the Republican Party of the Territory, Jonah Kuhio Kalaniana'ole.

With one accord the convention sang Hawaii Pono.

Kalaniana'ole thanked the convention for the honor of again being their standard bearer, but said the most important duty the people of the Territory had to perform was to nominate good clean men for the Legislature and Senate, as they are in a position to do the greatest or the most harm, as they follow their natural inclinations. He received enthusiastic applause.

On nominations of the various districts the following were appointed as members of the Territorial Central Committee:

At the close of the convention the Executive Committee met and elected A. G. M. Rogerson, Chairman; John C. Lane, Vice-President; Wm. Savage, Secretary; W. R. Farrington, Treasurer.

The members of the convention waited outside until the Executive Committee had adjourned and then all went up town to the Armory where a luau was in waiting for all of the delegates.

The luau was a decided success, and after it was over the members attended a church fair given by the Catholic Ladies Aid Society.

Here a jolly good time was enjoyed to the great financial advantage of the ladies.

Some of the boys took some of the torches of the ladies and forming an immense procession marched through the town cheering everything and everybody.

The most bewildered police officer seen in Wailuku for many a day was Manuel Sequeira, who happening to come within their march was surrounded and marched to one of the booths, and made to buy some of the paper flowers for sale. The boys then gave him three cheers and a tiger and allowed him to depart.

At a late hour most of the delegates took the Kinau and returned to their homes well satisfied with the result of their labors and the evening's sports.

COUNTY REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

The Republicans held their convention in the Knights of Pythias building last Monday and nominated County and district officers for the coming campaign. Before the voting of the convention the different delegations went into caucus and practically agreed on their choice for the nominees for the convention.

Up to the time of this caucus it was not definitely known who the nominees for several of the district offices would be. The Molokai delegation soon agreed on their choice and Hana did the same while Wailuku District not only made its choice for the district officers but on the nomination of W. J. Coelho by J. B. Thompson, assistant manager of the Hawala Commercial and Sugar Company, decided on him as their choice for the office of senator.

Tom. H. P. Baldwin was elected temporary chairman and S. Kellinoo temporary secretary.

M. H. Reuter, W. Henning, J. Freitas, J. K. Nakaleka, and D. C. Lindsay were appointed a committee on credentials.

Senator A. N. Hayselden, R. A. Wadsworth, W. P. Haha, T. M. Church, T. T. Meyers, J. D. McVeigh and H. P. Baldwin were appointed a committee on rules and order of business.

On the perfecting of the temporary organization Judge A. N. Kepoikai was unanimously elected as chairman of the convention, A. N. Hayselden, vice chairman, S. Kellinoo Secretary, and W. Henning, Treasurer.

A recess was then taken until 1:30.

On the reconvening of the convention W. J. Coelho was the only nominee of the convention as senator and as there were no other nominations he was nominated by acclamation. Mr. Coelho was elected to the office two years ago and has the reputation of being an incessant worker. In the Wailuku District Improvement Association he helped to accomplish much good for the improvement of the town. Coelho is a natural born politician, and a sure winner at the polls next November.

J. K. Nakaleka was unanimously nominated for the office of representative from Molokai and should receive the support of every voter who has the welfare of the County at heart. Philip Pali, the watch dog of the house is so well known and has done his work so well that little need be said of him except that he has been in the house for a long time and has proven himself one of the best men the house has ever had. M. P. Waiwaiole, John Kaluna, J. Kanama Kapoi and Antone Gomes should receive the heartiest support of all and should and will all be elected. These men are so superior to those put up by the Home Rulers that there is no comparison between them. Let every one vote for them to a man and elect them all.

County Officers.

The county officers elected at the last election were all renominated for the same offices they now hold, and will all be elected. These men without a single exception should be returned to their respective offices as a reward for the able manner in which they have conducted the affairs of their offices. It is a sound political custom of the States that any officer who administers his office successfully shall be returned to his office for at least a second term, as a reward for his services, and as an incentive to others to do the same. This policy will doubtless be followed here, and is a policy that all should follow.

After the nominations, the Territorial platform was read and approved as a whole, and a vote of thanks to the Knights of Pythias was unanimously extended for the free use of the hall.

The chair appointed the following as members of the county central committee: Charles Gay, R. C. Searle, Wm. Henning, J. W. L. Marshall, R. A. Wadsworth, H. P. Baldwin, D. W. Napihaa, Moses M. Kekua, D. H. Kauloko, S. K. Pupuh, E. R. Keeke, W. F. Pogue, H. A. Baldwin, David Morton, W. A. Sparks, Guy Goodness, S. K. Kekahuna, Ed. K. Devauched, W. S. Paupu, J. D. McVeigh.

T. M. Couch then moved that in case of a vacancy the executive committee be and is hereby authorized to fill such vacancy. Carried.

The central committee then elected an Executive Committee consisting of H. P. Baldwin, President; Wm. Henning, Vice President; R. A. Wadsworth, Secretary; and H. P. Baldwin, Treasurer.

These members with D. H. Kauloko, H. A. Baldwin, J. D. McVeigh, and R. C. Searle constitute the executive committee of the County.

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
