## THE TWO JURIES HAVE BEEN DRAWN

Juries for October Term are Drawn.--Court will Hold Session in Lahaina.--Administrator Kapu Admits Shortage.

### DOUBLED PINEAPPLE PRODUCT.

Haiku Fruit and Pineapple Co. will Pack 23,000 Cases this Year. Will Build Larger Factory to Meet Requirements.--Rev. Turner is Called to Paia Church.

#### CIRCUIT COURT NOTES.

The Circuit Court convened Wednesday morning to consider estate and divorce matters and for the purpose of drawing juries for the October term which will be held in Lahaina.

Attorney J. L. Coke as chairman of the committee appointed to draft resolution relative to the death of Judge Kahaulelio addressed the Court and presented the resolutions adopted by the whole committee consisting of J. L. Coke, J. W. Kalua and J. M. Vivas. Mr. Coke moved the Court that the resolutions be adopted and that they be spread on the minutes of the Court records and be a permanent part of the records of the Court which was so ordered by the Court.

The resolutions were as follows:

#### RESOLUTION

Whereas, Daniel Kahaulelio, a member of this circuit has been taken from us by death and

Whereas, the said Daniel Kahaulelio has been a useful and respected resident of Lahaina and the island for more than half a century and

Whereas, for many years the said Daniel Kahaulelio has occupied with great ability and satisfaction various high and important offices within this jurisdiction.

Therefore be it resolved that we the members of the bar of the county of Maui in open court in session this day, Honorable A. N. Kepoikai presiding, place on record our feelings of grief and personal loss at the death of Daniel Kahaulelio and our sincere appreciation of the sterling worth as a citizen his rare ability as an officer and his loyalty and kindness as a friend and neighbor.

Resolved that we extend our sympathy to the family of Judge Kahaulelio in their great affliction and

Resolved that these Resolutions be spread on the minutes of the

Circuit Court of the Second Judicial Circuit.

Judge Kalua spoke in Hawaiian of the deceased. He was followed by County Attorney D. H. Case who moved the adoption of the resolutions. Presiding Judge A. N. Kepoikai spoke feelingly of the sterling qualities of the deceased and of his long and intimate friendship for him and of his often seeking advice from him in time gone by. Judge Kepoikai then ordered the resolutions be entered of record.

A petition for declaration of heirs of William Cooper was taken up. The petition set forth that the estate was worth \$800.00 cash \$500 realty and about \$250 personal property or a total of \$1500.

From the evidence submitted it appeared that J. P. Cockett of Ulupalakua is the only surviving heir of Pihl the heir of Cooper, as his mother and Pihl were sisters and the only members of the family.

Some very old men were called as witnesses and their testimony was clear and to the point.

The affairs of the estate are in any thing but a satisfactory state.

Some years ago while Judge J. W. Kalua was on the bench he appointed Rev. S. Kapu as administrator of the estate. The administrator now admits there is a shortage in his accounts. He came into the News office and stated that during the time that Kalua was on the bench that he Kalua went to see him and told him to turn the money over to him (Kalua) which he did. Asked as to the amount of money he paid Kalua he said it was over six hundred dollars. The accounts have not yet been filed and until that is done no official action can be taken. The accounts will doubtless be filed in a few days.

The libel suit of Thomas Holstein against his wife Bernice K. Holstein was heard and a divorce granted on the ground of extreme cruelty.

One of the witnesses in the suit for divorce in the suit entitled Kolokahiki v. Kolokahiki was heard. The husband of the plaintiff is a confirmed leper and confined in the settlement at Kalaupapa.

#### MAKAWAO LINES.

The Haiku Fruit and Packing Co. has increased its output nearly a hundred per cent. Last year its record was 12,000 cases of canned pineapples. This year 23,000 cases is the estimate with a winter crop of 10,000 cases additional. This seems to warrant a new and larger manufactory.

Another domestic industry that is doing well is that of grape-growing and wine making at Kaupakalua. Last year the winery pressed out 7,500 gallons of burgundy, this year 14,000 gallons is anticipated in spite of the fact that bad weather has injured the grapes. The yield of grapes in the Kaupakalua section this year was evidently a hundred per cent greater than last year. Of the 72 stockholders of the local wine company all with three or four exceptions grow grapes and if the wine company proves successful will increase the area of their vineyards. At present they are receiving 50 cents per gallon for wine made of their grapes. The wine company has about 18,000 gallons of wine in storage.

At a meeting of the church and society of the Paia Foreign Church held at the church last Sunday after the regular service, it was voted to call Rev. E. B. Turner of Honolulu to be pastor for one year to succeed Rev. V. Bazata.

Mr. Turner who has been assistant pastor of the Central Union Church of Honolulu will arrive from Honolulu today (the 4th). His family is expected on Saturday, the 7th.

A reception will be given Rev. and Mrs. Turner on Friday evening, the 13th.

Mamalo Seminary, Paia, will open on Wednesday, the 11th Miss Heusner, the principal states that a full school is expected and that all pupils should be prompt in entering.

Last Saturday, Aug. 31st, Miss Elizabeth Mattison, the new music teacher to succeed Miss Ormerod, arrived on Maui. Miss Mattison is a graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory of Music.

Plover are returning to the Makawao pastures and pleasant shooting will begin on the 15th. This recalls the new hunting regulation that no one is allowed to hunt (carry a gun) without paying an annual license fee of five dollars. This rather severe law was passed in order to protect the game. It has been the custom in the past for irresponsible people in certain localities to slaughter birds indiscriminately, not caring whether the birds have broods of young or not.

Theodore Richards of Honolulu made a brief business visit to Makawao last week staying only one night.

Rev. and Mrs. A. S. Baker of Kona are visiting Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Nicoll of Hamakapoko. Mr. Baker has been quit ill, but is better.

## COUNTIES MAY GET MORE MONEY

Governor Frear Considers Plan to Assist Counties--Treasurer Campbell Seeks to Float new Bond Issue.

## IS CHARGED WITH MURDER MOST FOUL

Jailor is Accused of Murdering Prisoner by Kicking Him to Death--Object to Employment of Hindu Labor to Exclusion of Whites--Abercrombie Commits Suicide.

HONOLULU, September 6.--Governor Frear is considering a plan whereby the Counties may get more money for improvements. President Pinkham of the Board of Health publishes a warning today against using Nuanuu water without first boiling or filtering. Treasurer Campbell leaves today to float the new bond issue authorized by the last Legislature after first obtaining the approval of the President.

High Sheriff Henry proceeded to Kauai last night. Enoka Lovell, the Lihue jailor, is accused of murdering a prisoner by kicking him to death.

BELLINGHAM, Wash. September 6.--As a result of the anti-Hindu agitation 500 recently arrived Hindus were taken to jail for protection. A mob of 500 attacked the mills where they were employed to the exclusion of white men and completely wrecked the plant.

PARIS, September 6.--The situation in Morocco is serious. The Moorish forces in resisting the attempts to subjugate them will probably lead to dissension between France and Germany.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 6.--Request has been made upon Mayor Taylor to pay the expenses of the Federal aid in suppressing the plague. Friction results and the President of the Board of Health resigns.

W. H. Abercrombie, formerly consul at Nagasaki, committed suicide.

HONOLULU, September 5.--The following dispatch was received yesterday by the High Sheriff:

C. F. Chillingworth is expected to return home by the steamer Nevada.

HONOLULU, September 4.--Attorney-General Hemenway endorses Auditor Fisher's action relative to Nuanuu dam payments. Sailors from the fleet in port complain of bad treatment at the hands of the Honolulu police.

The steamer Sierra with a heavy passenger list, including the Bulletin beauties, leaves at 5 p. m.

PARIS, September 5.--The situation in Morocco is again most serious and will probably necessitate sending more troops to operate under General Druce.

ANTWERP, September 5.--The military is in control of the city. During a fight yesterday twenty strikers were injured. A fire was started doing damage to the amount of \$1,000,000.

PEKING, September 5.--Yuen Shai Kaa, a member of the Progressive Party, has been appointed head of the Department of Foreign Affairs.

BERKELEY, September 5.--The University will shortly begin a series of experiments with fleas to determine the extent to which they may transmit bubonic plague.

PARIS, September 5.--The King of Anam, the visiting Siamese ruler, has announced his abdication in favor of his son.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 5.--Louis Glasz has been sentenced to five years in San Quentin.

HONOLULU, September 4.--A meeting of the stockholders of the Automatic Telephone Co. ratified the deal made with Gilman and a company is assured.

The new pump at the Nuanuu dam has broken down and Superintendent Holloway's resignation is imminent.

William L. Whitney, at present First District Magistrate of Honolulu, will be the First Deputy Attorney-General and D. H. Case of Maui a possible second deputy. Frank Andrade is to be First District Magistrate.

Ewa plantation has finished grinding her crop which exceeds 32000 tons.

Many sailors from the cruisers in port are ashore. Beretania street is to have a limited ten minute car service.

No Mahiland news received this morning.

CASA BLANCA, September 4.--In an engagement yesterday with French troops the Moors were repulsed and lost heavily.

HAVANA, September 4.--The masons have gone on a strike. They demand pay in American coin.

MADRID, September 4.--A fleet of war vessels has been ordered to proceed to the scene of trouble in Morocco.
