A Political muddle. The conditions that have been allowed to develop locally bid fair to be the most serious political muddle that has yet confronted the leaders of the Republican party.

After years of hard work by the united efforts of the better element the Republicans have succeeded in getting out holding the control of practically every office in the county, both Territorial, County and District.

With the election of good clean men to office who are competent and courteous as any officials that can be found in the counties of the states on the mainland one would naturally expect harmony and the universal support that their records merit.

It would seem that it has not in any way been a race issue but a number of our best citizens of each race here have been objects for the targets of those who are out in the field to do harm to any and all whom they do not like.

As a result of this course on the part of these people County Attorney D. H. Case has resigned and a serious condition confronts the party. If this act of his were all it would not be so bad but those who know assert that it is but a beginning of the difficulties that have been brought on by the campaign of destruction of the character of many of our best citizens.

Those who are responsible for the evil conditions that now exist are but few in number but make their work especially objectionable by at least claiming to represent the highest leaders of the party.

It is time that this condition be called to a halt and one and all be brought to a realization that it is in the interest of the entire community that we all work for the interests of the community instead of working for personal spite and the crushing of those against which certain individuals have a grudge.

Matters Political. It is lamentable that a man who has always sought to do every thing possible for the betterment of the community in which he has lived for so many years should suffer as a result of the wrong doing and ill advice of his friends or rather those whom he regards as his friends but this is just what a very large number of the best citizens of Maui believe to be the position of Honorable H. P. Baldwin at the present time.

That Mr. Baldwin should exert a very great influence in social, political and financial affairs is natural. There are very few people of standing in the community who believe Mr. Baldwin has any other than good motives in political affairs but there are a great many who are convinced that he listens too much to those who do not possess the character he believes them to.

Conditions have reached an acute stage at which an amicable adjustment of differences is imperative.

This will be a Fairy City.

Honolulu, July 8.—Honolulu is by degrees being turned into a fairy city. A corps of men are wiring the principal streets of the city and making networks of wire round and about some of the largest buildings, on which a dazzling array of electric lights will blossom during the night.

Never before has such an elaborate scheme of decorations been attempted here and when all is finished and the current is turned on Honolulu will present a sight worth going a long way to witness. Lights have already been strung along Alakea Hotel, King and part of Fort street.

The Capitol building is completed but the grounds have still to be wired and strung with lamps. Four hundred lights will be put in and around the old fishmarket and the Seaside Hotel is to have two hundred lamps installed in readiness for the float festivities.

So far 2000 incandescents have been strung along the streets, and this is exclusive of the Capitol decorations. Over eight tons of wire will have been used when the work is completed.

Thirty-three men are on the job today and are working hard to finish the illuminations by Tuesday week. It is probable that a general test will be made next Sunday.

Sunday is the best day for a test as on that day the engines have less demand on them than on any other day of the week.

The demand for extra electricity is being met by the combination of the plants of the Alexander Young Hotel, Catton, Neill & Co.; Honolulu Iron Works and the Hawaiian Electric Company in the good cause, each plant helping out as much as possible in its own district.

Alexander Young is furnishing his own electricity for the illuminating of the Young, Hawaiian and Moana hotels.

The general wiring of the city is being conducted under the supervision of A. Menefoglio, superintendent of the Hawaiian Electric Co.

A very effective decoration is being arranged at the headquarters of the Rapid Transit Company. Pains are being taken to make the display unique and as effective as any other illumination in the city.

Volunteer Fire Company Elects New Officers.

The Wailuku Volunteer Fire Company met in their fire station Monday evening and elected Geo. W. Maxwell as Secretary of the Company in place of Joseph Nunes, who is now in Honolulu. The nominees were: G. W. Maxwell, A. H. Silva, and E. H. Hart.

For Delegate Chas. O'Sullivan was elected. The nominees were A. do Rego, L. H. Silva, Chas. O'Sullivan.

There was a fair attendance. After the election the matter of the whereabouts of the flag was taken up. Foreman Braun stated that a flag had been presented but that it could not be found on the Fourth of July and its whereabouts could not be located.

The company recently erected a flagpole and expected to have their flag to be used when occasion required, but up to the present time no one, unless it is Chief Coelho, has even had a look at the flag.

A fire alarm was turned in and the boys given a run to the Maui Hotel when it was announced that the alarm was one for drill and the hose cart was ordered back to the station.

win, Ed. Peck, and D. C. Lindsay, "Whites" D. T. Fleming (captain), F. F. Baldwin, H. A. Baldwin, L. K. Smith, and E. B. Turner.

The Haiku pineapple cannery is now in full action. Every day cart-loads of smooth cayenne pines from the plantations of Henry Alexander, S. R. Dowdle, W. I. Wells, Pakalani Pineapple & Dairy Co., W. O. Aiken and others can be seen on the road to the factory where 108 mill-hands are working continually as busy as bees.

On Saturday June 27th, 23,000 two-pound tins were put up at the factory. In the storeroom a thousand cases are ready for shipment to London, England, where a market has been obtained.

The pineapple company has recently added storehouses 100 feet square, and so rushed that pineapples not contracted for can not be received at the factory.

The Kaupakalua winery has also increased its storage capacity in tanks and buildings 100 per cent, and will begin work in a week or two as the grape crop is nearly ripe. A tower for the still is completed and Manager Cole states that he will use all the pineapples that can be obtained.

NEW YORK, July 9.—The weather is cooler. There have been no heat prostrations.

According to present advices the third division of the Atlantic fleet, consisting of the battleships Louisiana, Virginia, Ohio and Missouri, under the command of Rear-Admiral W. H. Emory, will anchor off Maalaea Bay, presumably about noon of the 16th inst, as the remaining vessels of the fleet are due to arrive at Honolulu at 1 p. m.

Louisiana, flagship, Capt. K. Niles, Virginia, Capt. A. Sharp, Ohio, Capt. C. W. Bartlett, Missouri, Capt. G. A. Merriam. Each vessel will have about twenty-five officers and 750 men.
