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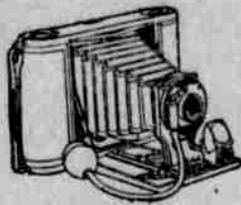

Honolulu News.

HONOLULU, Dec. 6.—Arrangements may be made for an aviation meet in Honolulu soon. Glen Curtis can be secured 4 days for \$15,000. An ultimatum has been presented to the Chinese Consul that he must retract or a demand will be sent in for his recall. It is rumored that the Customs Service here will be investigated. The Honolulu Iron Works has refused orders for mills from Louisiana and Texas. Jack Atkinson will be succeeded as Chairman of the Central Territorial Committee, by Alfred Cooper, C. James will succeed Cooper. The paving of Fort street is likely to be again delayed as Lord and Young have threatened injunction.

HONOLULU, Dec. 5.—The first shipment of cotton from the Makapuu Plantation, consisting of 2,200 pounds, will go forward on the Alaskan. It is expected to bring 20 cents per pound. Word comes from Japan that Negoro has told Count Komura about the alleged mistreatment he received here. The C. M. Cooke estate has bought the Judd building. Double track service began on King Street yesterday. Factional fights among the Chinese are becoming serious. Tong wars may be the outcome. The Chinese Consul has declined to meet the agitators. The Elks memorial services were held yesterday, and was largely attended. The oration was delivered by Cathcart, and is considered the greatest ever delivered in Honolulu. John F. Colburn, Jr., and Mrs. Nawahi were married yesterday.

Honolulu Chinese Denounced.

HONOLULU, Dec. 3.—The Territory wins the Pepeekeo land case in the Supreme Court. Attorney-General Lindsay does not consider the title to Kawai-ahao church property valid, but assures the congregation that the Territory will make it good. The circus cannot open today on account of the prevailing high winds. Thirty automobiles will participate in the Floral Parade. The Merchants' Commissioners to China arrived from the Orient by the Chiyo Maru. They report that the last of the boycott against American goods has disappeared. A number of Honolulu merchants, employees of Chinese business men, and Hee Fat, a rice planter, have been denounced in Peking as allies of Dr. Sun Yat Sen. Wrestlers from Japan will be here in February. A woman in Iwilei was stabbed by two unknown Chinese. The Merchants' Association are considering a proposition for fruit steamers to carry bananas between the Islands and the mainland every twenty days. John C. Baker, agent to grant marriage licenses may have his commission cancelled on account of so many elopements of minors being traced to his office as their starting point.

The English Elections.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The country is in the midst of another election. The issue is the veto power of the House of Lords. So far the elections have been equally divided for and against the government. NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Aviator Drexel has quit the aero club of America owing to disagreements. BOSTON, Dec. 6.—The funeral of Mrs. Baker Eddy will be held quietly on Thursday. WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Chas. A. Prouty and Franklin K. Lane, may be two of the appointees to the Commercial Court. The short session of Congress, commenced yesterday. LONDON, Dec. 5.—The Lord Mayor dined 750 American sailors yesterday. WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The population of the State of Idaho has increased over 100 per cent.

Mrs. Eddy Dead.

BOSTON, Dec. 5.—Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy, the founder of Christian Science died yesterday from natural causes. Mrs. Eddy was born in Bow, N. H., was educated in Sanbornton Academy. The founding of the great Christian Science movement can be dated from 1866. Her book "Science and Health" was published in 1875, and has now reached a popularity among christian nations second only to the bible. The mother church in Boston has a membership of about 30,000, and her teachings have spread to every corner of the earth. Mrs. Eddy lived on Concord, a few miles from Boston.—ED WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Ballinger will present a ship subsidy bill which he believes will have the support of Congress. BERLIN, Dec. 5.—The German Minister of War has issued a proclamation that no airships shall go within six miles of fortifications without special permission. WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—General Wesley Merritt, died here yesterday. PEKIN, Dec. 5.—Negotiations have been begun for a foreign loan of \$25,000,000 to increase the navy. Contracts will be let to American yards. Prince Tsai Hsun, will be at the head of the navy department.

Diaz Treats with Rebels.

CHIHUAHUA, Mexico, Dec. 3.—President Diaz has named a commission to meet the revolutionists and make terms. OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—The Canadian parliament has passed a bill authorizing the construction of a navy to be built in Canadian yards. WASHINGTON, Dec.—General Eugene Carr, a veteran of the Civil War is dead. NANTES, France, Dec. 3.—The lower part of the city is flooded by an overflow of the river Loire. Much suffering prevails among the people of the flooded district.
