Maui's Float.

WHAT is Maui going to do regarding the big carnival of next February? That this island should be represented by a float, goes without saying. The Maui spirit will demand that the Valley Isle be properly represented in Honolulu on the biggest day of the year.

In Honolulu all is bustle and hard work at present. The men in charge of the arrangements and preparations for the carnival are going ahead with their work in good shape, and the prospects of having the best gala day in the history of the Hawaiian Islands are bright.

The Maui Chamber of Commerce should take up the matter of the float that is to represent this island, and no efforts should be spared to make the Maui entry the best in the whole parade.

Judge Davis struck the right note when he declared at the meeting of the Bar Association, that a couple of years ago all Maui was kicking against Judge Kingsbury but that, at the present time, all the decent citizens of the island are very much in favor of retaining Judge Kingsbury on the bench. To have turned the judge down would have been a bad mistake. He has always been fair, square and impartial, and he has always acted as a gentleman. Because he will not waste time over some badly taken points of law, a certain class of lawyers have no use for the judge.

Good hearted people of Maui are signing a petition asking for clemency on behalf of young McBryde, the youth who was arrested in Wailuku some weeks ago as a deserter from the Fifth Cavalry. The petitioners ask that as much mercy as possible be shown the deserter on account of his young wife and infant child. If, on any occasion, it is possible for the Military authorities to temper justice with mercy, the case alluded to should have a claim on the attention of the army court.

The Christmas number of The Paradise of the Pacific is the best ever issued from the presses of the well known company. The lavish amount of illustrations and reading matter comes as a surprise. The pictures are well chosen and two in particular—"Sunrise" and "Sunset" are beautiful specimens of the art of modern printing. The Paradise goes to all parts of the world and there should also be a big local demand for copies of the Christmas number.

Judge Kingsbury missed the endorsement of the Bar Association by only two votes. Considering that several lawyers who would have voted for him did not receive notice of the meeting in time to attend, it can be seen that Judge Kingsbury had had luck as far as the Bar Association went. However, Governor Frear sent Kingsbury's name to the President and that settled matters. Maui is to be congratulated on the reappointment of the Judge.

The question of schools seems to be interesting more people than ever before, and the fact that prominent people are writing and talking of the subject every day, shows that, in the future, the people who pay the taxes that keep up the institutions, will do all in their power to get a system that they think is best for the peculiar needs of Hawaii.

It is to be hoped that the Kihei boat landing will be constructed as soon as possible. The sum available is sufficient to build a wharf on modified plans, and even that will be better than nothing.

There is more talk of Maui now-a-days than ever before in Honolulu. The advertising the island is getting from different sources is telling the tale, and Maui is kept well before the public.

KINGSBURY GETS IT.

Easy Visits To Honolulu

Claudine, Leaving Kahului On Saturday Afternoons Will Land Passengers At Early Hour.

When the new schedule of the steamer Claudine is in force, it will be an easy thing to visit Honolulu and only be away from Maui for a few hours. Sailing direct from Kahului for Honolulu, the steamer will get underway at four o'clock on Saturday afternoons. The run down, or is it up, to Honolulu will take six and one half hours. On that basis the Maui man can enjoy his soda water in Honolulu at half-past ten o'clock on Saturday night.

At the meeting of the Maui Chamber of Commerce, last week, the attitude of the Chamber on the question was asked for by J. N. S. Williams. After some discussion it was moved and seconded that Mr. Williams be instructed to inform the Inter-Island Company that the Maui Chamber of Commerce favored the idea of having the Claudine leave Kahului at four o'clock on Saturday afternoon, instead of at five.

The advantages of being able to board a steamer at four o'clock in the afternoon, and to be on Fort street at half-past ten o'clock that night, were fully realized by the members of the Chamber of Commerce and the remark was passed that the Claudine would very often be a crowded boat.

If the original schedule had been adhered to, the steamer would have to sail at five in the afternoon. That would land passengers in Honolulu just about in time to miss the last cars to the suburbs. In order to avoid this and to enable the passengers to catch the last cars, the change to four o'clock is to be made.

Algaroba Will Return Coin

W. H. Hoogs, the "Algaroba Pet," was in town during the week. He made a hurried business trip and talked kiawe all the time. The big feed company which Mr. Hoogs represents, is branching out in every direction, and the merits of algaroba as a feed is becoming known from one end of the world to the other.

The poor man can make good money by collecting the beans and shipping them to the mill in Honolulu. Algaroba trees flourish on Maui and the Kihei beans are the largest and best in the group.

Local mills for the grinding of the Algaroba beans will soon be in full swing and then the industry will go ahead faster than ever.

Lahaina News.

The Rev. H. Mason, who has made a successful search for water in this town and on Lanai, is a clergyman of the Church of England. About 19 years ago he had a call from New Zealand, and he has charge of a large parish in the suburbs of Auckland. He first became aware of his wonderful gift while working on his own land near Auckland. In many instances he has discovered plentiful supplies of water in that vicinity. The Bishop of Auckland has given a special license to Mr. Mason to exercise this remarkable gift. It is pleasant to know that Mrs. Mason, who is now in Honolulu, has similar powers.
