Hilo Has New Ball League A new baseball league is being organized in Hilo with four teams to start with, and perhaps more. The teams are—Hawaii Consolidated Railway, Japanese-Americans, Y. M. I. S. and Hilo Electric Lights.

The estate of the late Francis M. Swanzy, of Honolulu, is estimated to be worth about \$680,000, according to the widow who has filed application for letters of administration for W. H. Baird. Data Re-Year's Work

The following data relates to the work of the Board during the year: (1) During the year thirteen meetings were held. It has been the aim of the Board to hold meetings at least once each month. RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on its experience of the past year and a half, this Board believes that a number of changes might well be made in Act 221, S. L. 1915, in the interests of equity. It therefore submits the following recommendations with the suggestion that the same be brought to the attention of the Legislature: (1) Section 9—Period of Compensation—Should be amended so as to cover entire period of dependency. (2) Section 12—Medical Attendance—No limit of time for supplying necessary surgical, medical, or hospital treatment should be imposed, and the amount of such service should be increased from a maximum of \$50.00 to a maximum of \$150.00. (3) Section 13 and 14—Waiting Period—Seven days, instead of 14 days should be the period following injury

during which no compensation is paid. (4) Section 14—Partial Disability. Loss of one eye is not included as a partial disability, but should be so recognized. We have had one or two cases of this kind in which only the surgical fees were borne by the employer. Under the law this might have been limited to \$50.00, with no compensation for first 14 days.

(5) Section 49—Insurance—(a) The need of a uniform form of insurance policy has been very evident to this Board. We therefore strongly recommend that every insurance company authorized to write compensation insurance in the Territory, be required to adopt a form of policy to be prescribed in this Act, or by the Industrial Accident Boards together, or by a Board to be created. (b) This board has always believed that serious injustice is done to small employers by the practice of the insurance companies of requiring a minimum fee of \$10.00 for writing a policy. We further believe that if such minimum is to be fixed, it should not amount to more than \$5.00.

(c) Because of the limited field for compensation insurance in this Territory, and the consequent more or less indifference on part of insurance companies to this class of insurance, the board feels that the rates are perhaps not equitable or as low as consistent with good business methods. We therefore recommend that a Territorial Insurance Fund be established, to be administered under direction of the Territorial Treasurer or of the Accident Board, upon the same principles, and upon the same general requirements as those governing Mutual Insurance Associations. We do not recommend, however, that such Territorial Insurance Fund be made to exclude approved insurance stock or mutual companies from doing business in the Territory. (6) Accident Board—We believe that our experience has shown the desirability of making a single Board responsible for the administration of the Workmen's Compensation Law throughout the Territory instead of separate boards for each County. At present four boards work without coordination or even knowledge of each other's activities. A single Board or Commission of say five members, should administer the law for the Territory and at the same time the Territorial Insurance Fund to be established. The Board should be given authority to employ such clerical assistance on the several Islands as necessary. It should be required to hold hearings on the Islands on which accidents occur, whenever occasion for such hearings arise.

SUGAR CONSUMPTION INCREASING

The people of the United States are apparently using more sugar than ever before, for the increase in consumption has been greater than the increase in population. According to figures in Bulletin 473, recently prepared by the Bureau of Crop Estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture, the total consumption of sugar in this country for the decade ending with the fiscal year 1912-13 was 42.9 percent greater than the consumption for the preceding decade, while the population for the same period only shows an increase of twenty-one percent.—Weekly News Letter.
