It happened on Wednesday that a dispatch of this character was used by the GAZETTE for the first time since we have been taking our present telegraphic service. However, we have no apology to make for the occurrence, and shall repeat it if we see, fit, though it is not at all likely to happen often, as we always have the New York papers at hand for all news of this character we desire to publish. We hope our Shipley street neighbor will not bother itself about the GAZETTE's news arrangements, as they do not concern it in the least. Let it attend to its own affairs, and stop lying to the public about the location of its office, and it will have about, all it can conveniently manage.
