THE PLANETS A Quartette of Brilliants-Interest ing to Star Gazers.

Mercury is evening star and wins the place of honor, as he is the only planet visible after sunset during the month, and Courier Journal, in his letter of the 2d inst. is one of the most favorable positions for thus pleasantly refers to the "attraction On the 19th he reaches his greatest eastern elongation, or most distant point from the sun, and for ten days before and after that time, if the atmosphere is clear and the sky cloudless, he may be easily found. Observers should note carefully the point of sunset, for Mercury sets not far from one degree south of it. Three-quarters of an hour

gree south of it. Three-quarters of an hour after sunset is the best time to look, for the long twilight will prevent his being seen much earlier. He will then be about twelve degrees above the horizon, shining with an intense white light sometimes tinged with yellow, and with a brilliancy almost unequalled by any other star.

Uranus is evening star, but too far away to be visible to the naked eye.

Venus is morning star, and plays a brilliant role throughout the mouth, the fairest and brightest of the grand planetary quarand brightest of the grand planetary quar-tette that graces the morning dawn and heralds the coming of the great luminary. Jupiter is morning star and ranks second Jupiter is morning star and ranks second in brightness in the grand planetary exhibition that makes illustrious the annals of June, 1881. He is approaching the earth, and before the end of the month will shine in increased size and brightness. On the 19th, four hours before his conjunction with Venus, he passes very near Neptune, being only forty-four minutes of a degree north. It is rare for four planets to be so near together. On the first of the month they all rise within twenty-four minutes. Venus appears first, followed in order by Saturn, Jupiter and Neptune, the latest comer being invisible.

Saturn, Jupiter and Neptune, the latest comer being invisible.

Saturn is morning star and the space is gradually widening that separates him from his more brilliant brother Jupiter.

Mars is morning star, and will soon become an object of interest as his path draws near that of Jupiter and Saturn.

Neptune is morning star, and, though invisible to the naked eye, is worthy of notice from being so near Jupiter, Saturn and Venus on the same day, with only an interval of six hours between the two conjunctions, while Jupiter and Venus meet and pass during the interval.

The June moon fills on the 12th, and gives us the rare treat of a total lunar eclipse. No celestial phenomena is easier to understand. The earth passes between the sun and the moon and obscures his light.

SAVANNAH THROUGH LOUIS

A Pleasant Description. Mr. R. W. Knott ("Kent") the talented traveling correspondent of the Louisville

observation that occurs during the year. which Savannah has for a stranger on busimess or pleasure bent:"

"The city of Savannah has much to attract and interest a stranger. I have written of its importance as a commercial centre and of its export trade, and you will get the idea perhaps that it is very noisy and bustling and very disagreeable these early summer days, but this is very far from the truth. Indeed, it would be difficult to name a more pleasant city than is Savannah during the month of June. It puzzles you at first to find the city, it seems so lost among its trees and public squares. General Oglethorpe was wiser in his day and generation than most of those who laid out the cities of the future. The streets are straight, crossing each other at right angles, and at every other intersection he provided for a large square or park, until he had thirty-six of them, now lying right in the heart of the city. Consequently, Savannah is just like no other place. These little parks are now surrounded by handsome residences; they are ornamented with the live oak, the water oak, the Lombardy poplar and the magnolia tree. The sidewalks are also well shedd and the effect is delightful. The ness or pleasure bent:" water oak, the Lombardy poplar and the magnolla tree. The sidewalks are also well shaded, and the effect is delightful. The magnolia trees are especially beautiful; they are large, well shaped, and now full of flowers. On the sidewalk I measured one five and one-half feet in circumference, and it must have been fifty feet high. In addition to its shade, Savannah has nearly all the time a breeze, generally from the sea. Just at this time the streets are rather quiet, but when the fall trade opens it puts off its quiet ways and makes enough money in a

"No one should come to Savannah without seeing Bonaventure. This was formerly the residence of Commodore Tattnall; it is now a cemetery. The old Commodore was a man of strong peculiarities, and many ancedotes are told of him. He had invited a number of friends to dine, and just at the time the table was set it was discovered the mansion was on fire. Little could be done to save it, and it was almost entirely destroyed. When the excitement was over the Commodore ordered the table to be spread on the lawn, as he would not have a dinner party scattered by the burning of his house.

"Even the most unimaginative individual "Even the most unimaginative individual these "Even the most unimaginative individual must be impressed as he passes down these long avenues of live oaks, with their farspreading branches draped with moss, forming the most exquisite festoons nature ever makes. These groves are wide and long. It is said these oaks, now over one hundred years old, were planted in the form of the monogram of the Tatthall family. If so, all the letters have been lost in time except the letter T. The oaks are immense, and it seems as if you were passing down the alse of some grand cathedral. It is the poetic supposition that Gothic architecture owes its origin to the fact that early builders copied their forms and their decorations from the forests in which they dwelt, thus giving us the pointed arches and the groins of the vaulted roof. In Bonaventure this supposition amounts almost to a demonstration; architecture may imitate but can this supposition amounts almost to a demonstration; architecture may imitate but can not surpass the roof formed by the overarching and the interlined branches of these old oaks; while no artist could ever hope to equal the grace, delicacy and beauty of the moss which hangs from all their branches. The whole effect is impressive, and as the light fades these shapes become as weird and see favorations are well which have haunted. and as fautastic as any which have haunted the mind of Gustave Dore as he pondered the story of the Wandering Jew or illus-trated the verse of Dante.
