DEMOCRATIC LASH APPLIED TO COFFINISM

Crowd of 4,000 Listens to Speakers at Rally in Tomlinson Hall.

Whipping aside the mask of respectability donned by the Republican party after the primary, Democratic speakers at a record-breaking rally in Tomlinson hall Thursday night, stressed the issue of "Coffinism."

Speaker after speaker emphasized to more than 4,000 Democrats and Independent Republicans that this will be the only issue at the polls in Marion county, Nov. 4.

Mincing no words, the orators, led by Frederick Van Nuys, former United States district attorney, pounded at the record of the Republican county organization.

Evans Woolen, Indianapolis banker and favorite son nominee for President in 1928, was permanent chairman, being introduced by H. Nathan Swaim, county chairman.

Major is Speaker

Accomplishments of the Democratic city administration were cited by Mayor Reginald H. Sullivan, whose successful campaign for mayor was begun a year ago in the same hall.

Declaring that eighteen policemen have been indicted by the Federal grand jury, Sullivan said the board of safety will suspend members until after the trials. "If they are guilty they should and will be punished. If innocent, they should not be punished."

"If any men on the police force are guilty of violating their oath of office and their guilt comes to the attention of the board of safety, they will be punished," Sullivan promised.

OGDEN MOVES TO PUNISH IN MOB KILLINGS

Attorney-General Not to Let Marion Jury's No-Action Stand.

STATUTE PROVIDES WAY Sheriff's Impeachment is Possible Through Mere Fact of Lynching.

Sheriff Jacob Campbell of Grant county is not yet through with the Marion lynching case although a grand jury there praised and exonerated him for his conduct in permitting a mob to break into his jail and lynch two Negroes in the courthouse square.

For the state of Indiana, through its attorney-general, is taking a hand, as the law provides when local government fails to function.

Waiting on Jury

Up to this time, Ogden had declared he was waiting to give the grand jury an opportunity to act. After a month's investigation the grand jury adjourned Thursday without indicting a single member of the mob and giving high praise for Campbell's conduct.

On Leslie Probe Group
