DRIVERS OF AUTOS MAY GIVE BONDS

A bill introduced in the Senate by the Committee of the Whole, giving the supervisors of the various counties the authority and power to exact bonds from drivers of public vehicles has created considerable of a stir at Honolulu, and, if it becomes law, may affect a hundred or more chauffeurs of this island. The law proposed reads as follows:

"Section 1. The Boards of Supervisors of the several counties and the city and county of Honolulu are hereby authorized and empowered to require persons applying for license to operate self propelled vehicles for hire in the transportation of passengers or freight in their respective counties to first furnish a bond or bonds in a sum not exceeding Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for each such vehicle to be so operated, to indemnify any person injured in person or property by the operation or maintenance of such self propelled vehicle, if such injury shall result from negligence or malice on the part of the owner or operator of such vehicle.

SMITH PRINCIPAL SUMMER SCHOOL

The following comes from Honolulu:

Professor Cyril O. Smith, principal of the Kapaa school, will again be director of the Summer school in Honolulu. This was announced yesterday by Superintendent of Public Instruction Kinney. The summer term will begin July 6 and continue for four weeks.

The members of the faculty have not been decided upon as yet. Neither have all the studies been decided upon.

Fred E. Clowes, in charge of the government experiment station at Glenwood, Hawaii, will again be in charge of the agricultural course at the summer school. He was in charge of this work last year and many of the teachers took advantage of the opportunity to study the science of planting and bringing to maturity the things which the earth produces. This has aided them materially in many instances in teaching gardening to their pupils.

H. M. Westgate, in charge of the government experiment station here, together with the expert members of his staff, will aid Mr. Clowes in this work.

Immediately after the close of the summer term and during the week of August 2, examinations will be held for teachers' certificates. These examinations will be open to teachers who do not possess the certificates now required by the department of public instruction.

Kinau Dodges Blow

The Kinau had a very rough time of it making Kauai last Tuesday night. There was a strong head wind and exceedingly high seas. Her pilikia was accentuated by the presence on deck of twelve head of mules, in order to save which from accident Captain Gregory veered his ship westward toward Port Allen, and came up under the lee of the island. The Kinau did not reach Nawiliwili until 7 a. m., four to five hours late.

"That's right," retorted Isenberg. "We did not bargain what kind of a hat was to be given. Next time I bet a hat I'm going to have plans and specifications drawn up, approved and signed before the bargain is closed.—Advertiser."

START OF LARGER COMMITTEE IDEA

The idea of a larger Promotion Committee, in which all the islands should be represented, originated in the islands away from Honolulu and through long and persistent hammering developed into a recognizable movement. Following was the resolution reported by the directors to the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce on the subject, after the matter had assumed definite shape.

"Resolved, the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce of Honolulu hereby recommends to the Chamber that it adopt the following amendment to the by-laws of the chamber, viz.:

"Amend section 1 of article 1 by adding thereto the following words:

"The president shall, within like period, invite the Chamber of Commerce of Kauai, the Chamber of Commerce of Maui and the Board of Trade of Hilo, Hawaii, to each appoint a representative to sit with and be a member of the Hawaii Promotion Committee, to serve for one year, or until their respective successors are appointed, with equal power and authority with the other members of said committee.

"Upon the appointment of such representatives, as aforesaid, they shall be entitled to equal power and authority with other members of said committee."

The following further amendment to the chamber bylaws was suggested in the report:

"Amend article 1 by adding to section 2 thereof the following words, viz.:

"The committee shall in each year hold one or more meetings of the committee in each of the islands of Hawaii, Maui and Kauai to consider, in addition to general business, special features incident to the tourist business on such islands respectively."
