cultural resources of the country.

The sugar cane grows naturally throughout the group at various elevations, from the level of the sea to an altitude of 4,000 feet. Below the elevation of 1,700 feet the came is eight to seventeen months, according to the time of planting, in arriving at matucording to the time of planting, in arriving at maturity; it arrows, (if not less than seven or eight months old.) about the 20th of November; planted at any time after the 1st of June, it fails to develope the arrow at the usual ensuing season, and a growth of seventeen months may be thereby secured from the first planting. Above the altitude of seventeen hundred feet it seldom arrows, and is twenty to thirty, and sometimes thirty-six months, according to elevation, in maturing; but as a compensation for its slow growth, it may be planted every month in the year, and the crop, remaining on the ground seven or eight months after its maturity, does not materially deteriorate. Another advantage is found in the superior quality of the cane juice, in respect both to its density (11° to 13° Beaume,) and also to its purity, owing to the harder and more fibrous nature of the canes, which give out less of their foreign matters, when submitted to pressure, as indicated by a larger per centage of sugar, as well as by its superior quality. The bagasse is found to be ample for purposes of fuel.

There are several varieties of canes found at the islands; those most cultivated are the yellow, (or Tahitian,) the red or purple, and the green and our-ple ribbon; the latter is a rich, hardy cane, and suc-ceeds best on the high lands; the largest yield per acre has been obtained from the table lands of Maui, elevation 1,800 feet.
