He was the last known survivor of the ill-fated Boki expedition which left Honolulu in two vessels in December, 1828, to gather sandalwood in the South Pacific. One of the vessels, with the chief Boki on board, never returned to port, and the other arrived at Honolulu in August 1829, with twenty survivors only out of a company of 226 that embarked in her-the rest having dled of disease and tamine. Williams continued until a few years past to follow his avocation as a seaman, and was in one of the whalers destroyed by the Shenandouh in 1864. A claim of several hundred dollars was recently awarded him at Washington. He belonged originally, we believe to the state of Maine, and it is thought that Williams was an assumed name. It was now April. The reply of the French government to the communication which I bad addressed to it could not be far off. Mons. Drougn do L'Huys, then Minister for Foreign Affairs, had caused me to be informed that the Emperor had issued a decree, on the 24th of the preceding February, authorizing me to accept the high office which the King had conferred upon me, without losing my rights of French citizenship. Another decree, dated the 5th of March, conferred upon me the Legion of Honor, so that the Minister recognized my care of French interest in the Islands by conferring upon me distinguished honors. There was no reason, therefore, why I should not set myself immediately to work, and pursue courageously the task, the difficulties of which I could not conceal from myself, but which my ambition and

can say without false modesty, I had worked hard; not that I take to myself much credit for that, I had studied the country, Its language, origin, and history ; I had reckoned up well its means of pro duction, its natural markets, political tendencies, and the administrative reforms which were possi ble. Like all men who labor alone, I had arrived at certain conclusions, a little absolute, perhaps, but which having become convictions in my mind, gave me the necessary strength to apply them, without allowing me to be deterred by the difficulties of detail. In youth, one rarely doubts oneself, and when pre-conceived ideas are joined to the result of persevering labor, confidence in one's self quickly begets a like confidence in others, and rallies healtating men around him who has often no other merit than to know clearly what he wants, and to wish for to-day what he wished for yesterday and will wish for to-morrow. The French whalemen were the first to be discouraged, and had entirely abandoned to the Americans this description of enterprise. These last in their turn were getting discouraged, and every year the number of their ships was diminishing. The whalers, the principal sources of profit to our merchants, threatened to fail us altogether; we must needs therefore seek other resources and begin to cultivate, on a larger scale, products which would yield a certain return.
