SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 3. A Tour to Oregon and British Columbia.

[BY THE REV. ALEXANDER MACKINTOSH.] (Continued from our last issue)

There has been a little excitement lately owing the setting up of an opposition line of steamto the setting up of an opposition line of steam-ships between Portland and San Francisco. This reduced the cabin passage money from twenty-five dollars to ten. In another week a farther reduction to \$7.50 took place; and in one week more a person could travel first-class from San Francisco to Portland, a three day's journey-for five dollars, and in the steerage for two and a half,-this beats the Kilauea or Likelike for cheapness!

The people of Portland are better off for amusements and relaxation than the people of Honolulu. They have a very fine Public Library, which would do credit to any city. Subscribers have the privilege of introducing their friends, who then share the benefits of the Library for two weeks at a time. I suppose there would be scarcely any book extant that an enquirer could not get, judging from the size of the rooms and the number of books therein. Then the readingroom is fully supplied with the current periodicals and magazines, of almost every civilized country. This is necessary, for Portland is something like Honolulu in the diversity of its inhabitants. Then again there are side rooms where people can take their books or papers, or play games, or smoke or chat, -in all forming the most attractive of resorts. The Theatre is a handsome building, the ground story of which is used as a Market. The Market did not seem to be very flourishing. On one side, a part of the lower building is partitioned off into little rooms which are used as a restaurant. Here the business people have their luncheons, and people who live in lodgings their meals.

The Gymnasium is largely patronised by the young gentlemen of Portland. The Museum is

small, but very creditable There are several small Parks in the city, in which are stands for the convenience of bands of music, and one large Park which traverses the city from one end to the other. This last is planted with trees, and in a few years it will be a most delightful place. Boating on the smooth, broad river is largely indulged in. Pic-nie parties, both by day and by moon-light, pull up the river and encamp on the thickly wooded and picturesque islands with which the river is inter-

Portland cannot boast of its roads, though the scenery which one passes through is truly magnificent. The road by the "White House"-as it is called-is very decent, and leads through a forest of pine, maple, red and yellow fir, Oregon cedar, alder and spruce. The undergrowth is chiefly oak scrub, hazel, blackberry, wild gooseberry, huckleberry, and other berry bearing shrubs. The cañons are beautiful drives, if only your horses are docile and well under control A very slight shy would precipitate carriage and Doors, Windows and Blinds, all, thousands of feet below. But the grandest of all walks is that to Markham's Hill. The road winds round and round a densely wooded hill, until it reaches the summit; every now and then, a glimpse is afforded of the valley of the river, with the city at the end of it, when the top is reached the whole expanse of the country is open to view. Far away, rising out of the thick dark woods, the lofty snow-clad peaks appear, dazzling in their whiteness. Here and there a township brightens up the gloom of the deep green foliage. The placid surface of the Willamette lulls one into a deep reverie, from which one is rather rudely aroused by the appearance of a railway train, running along the bank, or of one of the river boats disturbing the

Portland is not behind the age in "Societies."

It is said that hardly ever does a man die in this city, but that he belongs to, and his funeral is undertaken by one or more of these Societies,-Free-mason, Odd-fellow, Good Templar, Knight of Pythias, Improved Order of Red Men,—and if it does happen that he is not a member of any of these, he is sure to be a Fireman or a Soldier. I believe that much the same may be said of our Honolulu citizens. The companies and wards of the Fire Department are on the same principle as those of Honolulu. The British Benevolent, and St. Andrew's Societies are flourishing.

There are five daily newspapers published in
Portland and three weekly. The Germans pub-

lish a paper in their own language. The people

are not exempt from newspapers even on Sundays. Hotels are numerous, but they sink into insignificance when compared with our beautiful Hawaiian building. The schools are numerous and are of the best description. The Government Central High School is an immense establishment. The Roman Catholic Sisters have a large school for girls St. Helen's Hall is the name of Bishop Morris's girls' school. The pupils number one hundred and fifty, and these have a staff of teachers numbering eleven. Every facility is given for a sound education, together with accomplishments both useful and ornamental. One wing of the hall is used as a chapel, another for the

Bishop's residence. The school-rooms are large and lofty. The whole building is exceedingly pretty, and the grounds are laid out with great The Bishop Scott Grammar School for boys only, is situated in a healthy locality. It affords an excellent education to its pupils. The Rev. George Burton is the Principal. The Bishop of the diocese is the Visitor, or Rector. All the schools were enjoying their holidays,-consequently I could not see them in working order. The people of Portland appear to be a great church-going people. Each religious body has its church, so the number seems legion. All, except the Roman Cathedral, add to the beauty of the town. There are two Synagogues. The Jews form a very considerable part of the popu-

lation of Portland. There are two Hospitals—one under the care of the Roman Catholic Sisters; the other under the supervision of Bishop Morris, who founded the establishment. An Orphanage adjoins this latter, which was also founded by the Bishop.

The population of Portland is formed of repre-

sentatives from nearly every nation under the sun

—I believe Turkey is the only European nation
unrepresented. However all unite in speaking the master language—English—and in their love for their adopted country. The greater propor-tion has been attracted there, with the hope of realizing a speedy fortune; but, with the loss of this hope, all have settled down to the only certain means of acquiring wealth—steady industry. I met some old Hawaiian friends.

Webster's Eloquence.

How "Black Dan" Electrified the Brokers. "While I was in the senate (said General Shields) I saw much of Webster both in and out plication to the undersigned. He met me one day and said; Shields, I find I have got into difficulty with some of my constituents, some Quakers, who are dissatisfied with my advocacy of a certain measure, and have sent a large delegation down here from Massachusetts to make a protest. "Your native blarney, Shields; it may help me out of this trouble." "I laughed at the idea of blarney effecting anything where Daniel Webster's eloquence could not convince; and I made that objection; but he insisted, and I promised to be on hand. Evening came, and I joined Mr. Webster at his rooms. Presently the delegation arrived and were seated, a dozen or twenty of the most solemn men I have ever seen, all rigidly costumed in Quaker dress. Without wasting any time the chairman arose and addressed Mr. Webster in a set speech. He commented severely on the course of the senator as to the measure in question, setting forth the bad effect which it might have on their sect, expressing great sorrow and suprise that Mr. Webster had been found supporting such a bill, and concluded with a vigorous protest in writing, which bore many signatures. Webster listened attentively with unchanged countenance, and when the spokesman had resumed his seat he rose and replied. He spoke half an hour, and before he concluded grew as eloquent as he was often heard. His defence was simply that he deemed the measure one demanded by the interests of the whole country, although it might not be

specially adapted to the wants and interests of any sect, and after clearly setting this forth, he made such an appeal to the delegation to remember that they were Americans as well as Quakers, that I was fairly electrified. The effect produced by his words on the delegation was astonishing. When he began they were all seated; after he had spoken ten minutes one after another rose to his feet, until they were all standing; then they commenced to move toward him, and they had soon surrounded him in a body. Before he finished I saw the chairman take out his petition and tear it to pieces; and when he had finished some of them were shedding tears, and

spokesmen, 'thee is right and we are wrong; we owe thee an apology; we will say no more about it; thee knows thy duty better than we.' "The next day I met Mr. Webster, and with a countenance of perfect gravity he said; Well, Shields, now didn't we blarney those fellows
