TRACK MEET AT HAYS

Saturday, May 1st, the Sixth district track meet was held at Hays. It was a fine day though it had rained heavily the evening before. Teams from Hill City, Hays, Russell, Ellsworth and Trego entered in all thirty men. The events were very closely contested and a magnificent Trophy cup presented to the winning team.

Each man who won a first received a black and gold pennant, the colors of Ft. Hays Normal.

The events and winners were as follows:

100-yard dash—Gross, Hays; Brown, Hill City—10 4-5.

Shot—Kerth, Trego—39 feet 9 inches.

Half Mile—Cass, Trego; Harlan, Trego—2:21.

Pole Vault—Beason, Trego; Ellsworth—9 feet 9 inches.

220 dash—Gross, Hays; Hill City—26.

Broad jump—McVey, Hill City; Beason, Trego—19 feet, 2 inches.

50-yard dash—Gross, Hays—5 4-5.

Discus—Kerth, Trego; Kerth, Trego—110 feet, 11 inches.

440-yard run—Beason, Trego; McVey, Hill City—58 3-5.

High jump—Beason, Trego; McVey, Hill City—58 3-5.

High jump—Beason, Trego; Hays—5 feet, 3 inches.

220-yard hurdles—Kerth, Trego; Russell.

Half-mile relay—Hays first, Trego second.

Trego won 50 points taking first in shot, half-mile, pole vault, discus, 440 yard dash, high jump and 220 hurdles; seconds in half mile, broad jump, discus and relay; and third in 50 yard dash, 220 yard dash and high jump.

Hays won 27 points, Hill City 19, Russell 6 and Ellsworth 5.

The beautiful trophy cup our boys brought home with them must be won in two consecutive years before it becomes the property of any school. Our boys must win it next year and then it can remain permanently with us.

Two Golden Belt records were broken, the discus and the shot both came to Trego.

This was the pleasantest meet it has ever been the writers privilege to attend at Hays. Every event was run promptly, no delay and no unnecessary questionings. Mr. Markwell of Hays handled the meet in excellent form.—High School Journal.
