HOG MARKET LAST WEEK WAS UNUSUALLY ACTIVE — CATTLE REMAIN STEADY.

Indianapolis, May 13.—Receipts on Saturday were: 4,000 hogs, 300 cattle and 50 sheep against 2,913 hogs and 164 cattle one week ago, and 6,127 hogs, 280 cattle and a few sheep one year ago.
The close of the hog market found prices 5 to 15 cents higher. Choice heavy grades sold up 5 cents, while the best light kinds sold 10 to 15 cents better. Receipts were fair for the last day of the week and trade active. The shipping element was in better evidence and choice light hogs were in strong demand. Heavy and light hogs now are selling practically on an even basis.

CINCINNATI MARKETS

LIBERAL MOVEMENT IN CATTLE MARKET DURING LAST WEEK — RECEIPTS WERE HEAVY.

Cincinnati, May 13.—Cattle—A liberal movement brought the number of cattle marketed during the last week up close to 4,900 head against 4,672 head the week before, 3,929 head two weeks ago and 3,871 head one year ago the same week. The trade has been a more satisfactory one throughout.
Bulls—Light receipts and good demand held prices steady, and the week closed on a steady and strong market at the same range of values a week ago.
Calves—There had been a good market for calves throughout the week at steady and firm prices until late Friday, when values turned downward under liberal receipts, and the late average of sales indicated 50c decline.
Hogs—There has been a fairly liberal and enlarged movement in hogs and the receipts amounted to nearly 18,000 head, against 13,587 head last week, 18,868 head two weeks ago and 17,072 head a year ago the same week. The quality of hogs is good and generally strong up to the usual standard at this time in the year.

PROFIT TAKING WORKED AGAIN THE WHEAT PRICES—GENERAL DECLINE.

Chicago, May 13.—The wheat market became weak shortly after the opening. The chief causes of the decline were the prediction of showers in Kansas and Nebraska, and profit-taking by local longs. Trading was very active, July opened 1/2c lower to 3/4c higher and sold down to 81 1/2c.
Profit-Taking in Corn.
The corn market opened steady on light receipts, but later eased off some what on profit-taking. Good weather for the movement of the crop was the main cause of the weakness. July opened unchanged to 1/4c higher and sold down to 46 1/4 @ 46 3/4c.
A prominent commission house was an active bidder for July and September oats, and because of this prices held steady.
The provision market was quiet at firm to higher prices.

NEW YORK MARKETS

PRICES CHARGED SMALL IN THE STOCK MARKET—GAINS AND LOSSES ABOUT EVEN.

New York, May 13.—Prices of stocks on Saturday changed only a little from yesterday's last quotations in the opening dealings today. Small gains and losses were quite evenly divided. A rise in Great Northern preferred of 1 1/2, and in Illinois Central and American Ice of 1 made the only changes of any note.
A close analysis of the first hour's business showed little advantage to either of the speculative factions, the market becoming even more irregular than at the opening. Amalgamated Copper, Union Pacific and Reading showed alternate periods of firmness and heaviness which, however, did not carry them far away from yesterday's closing. Missouri Pacific was notably firm and went up 1 1/2 with a sympathetic effect on the other Gould properties. International Pump preferred also moved up 1 1/2 and Locomotive, Atlantic Coast Line and Wabash preferred 1. International Pump yielded 1.
