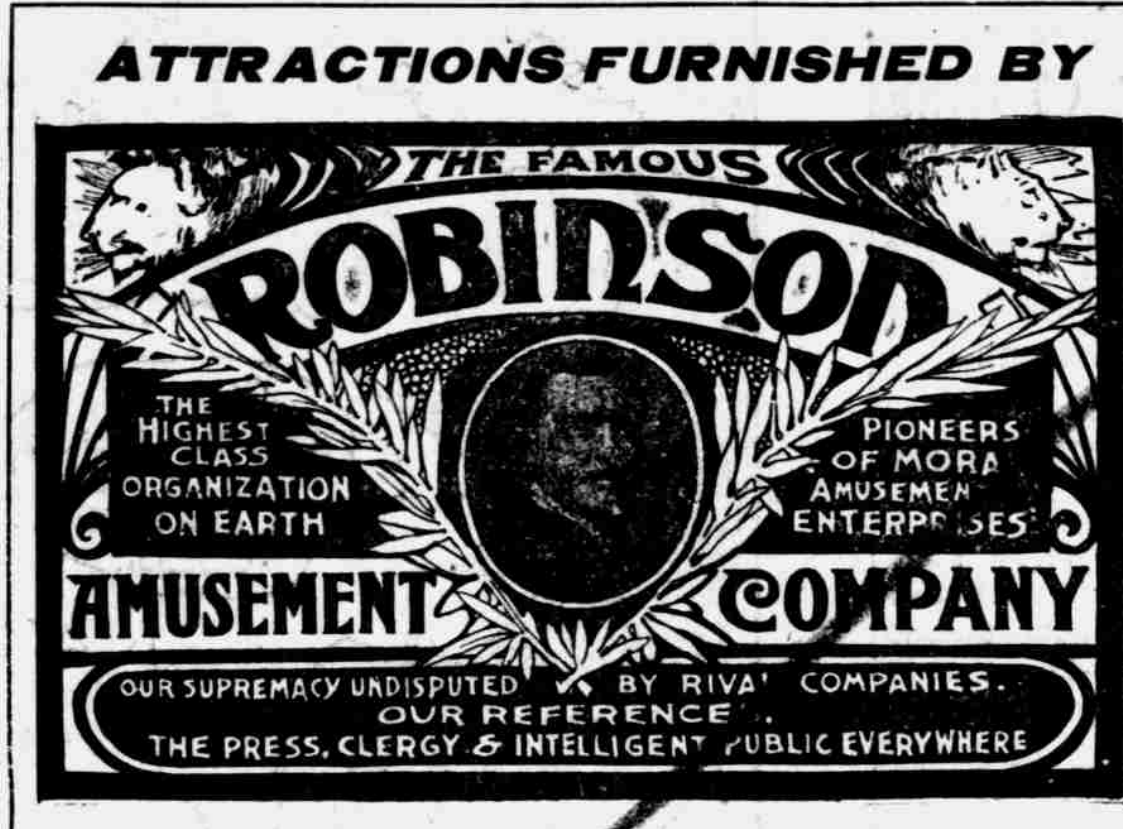

Indianapolis, Ind., July 14. (Sp.)—Swinging over the last half of his journey with machine-like precision after he had been outplayed in the morning round, Will Diddle retained his title as Indiana Golf Champion by defeating H. E. Zimmer in the finals of the Seventh Annual Tournament on the links of the Indianapolis Country Club. Diddle played the course in close to a bogey score before a gallery of about 200 people, his margin at the finish being 4 up and 2 to play. Zimmer put up a great fight for the honor and showed his class by being 1 up on his more experienced tournament player at the end of the morning round of 18 holes. He could not keep up his gait in the afternoon, however, while Diddle slowed down and played as deliberately and accurately as though he were in a practice contest.

Miss Bessie Rawls played an excellent game in the finals of the women's tournament, and won the title from Miss Eria Bowers, whom she defeated by the score of 1 up in 19 holes.

Brighton, Beach, N. Y., July 14.—

Captain W. S. Williams carried off the

rich Brighton Handicap, worth \$25,000

today with his game four-year-old
