RICHMOND WILL SEND DELEGATE

The Local Labor Unions to be Represented at State Meeting.

MANY BILLS PROPOSED

UNION LABOR HAS SOME RIGHTS WHICH IT WILL INSIST UPON BEFORE THE NEXT LEGISLATURE.

Richmond labor unions will be represented at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Federation of Labor to be held in Indianapolis September 25, 26 and 27.

It is proposed that a bill be introduced providing for a law by which barber shops may be closed on Sundays. Richmond barber shops do not open Sundays. The members in Indiana politics, especially of the Journeymen Barbers' International Union, have had a long and hard fight in their attempt to close the barber shops on Sundays, and have found that proceedings brought under the present law have ended in a most unsatisfactory manner. The State association of the barbers has drafted a bill, and it is the wish of the association to have the State Federation endorse this bill and work for its passage in the next session of the State Legislature.

Other Proposed Bills.
Under the head of legislation, it is probable that a bill will be drawn at the convention for the amendment of the present factory inspection law. Among other things, as contemplated the bill will provide for increasing the factory inspector's force and will provide that women less than twenty-one years old shall not be permitted to work in tobacco factories. It is said that it has been found that work in such factories is injurious to a woman's nerves.

Among other legislation that is expected to come up for discussion and action is a direct primary election bill and amendments to the mining laws. The State Federation has been active in legislative matters for a number of years and has assisted materially in the passage of a number of bills that were of benefit to labor unionists and to the public in general.

SUTTON LEAVES FORCE BACK TO RAILROADING

Will Go to New Mexico to Take Place as Locomotive Fireman on the Rock Island System—A Good Officer.

Officer Charlie Sutton, one of the most popular patrolmen on the Richmond police force, has tendered his resignation to the Board of Police Commissioners to take effect September 18.

Mr. Sutton will go back to his first love, that of firing on the railroad and has accepted a run on the Rock Island between Alamogordo, New Mexico, and El Paso, Tex. He secured the position through A. C. Teas, an engineer, who ran on the Pennsylvania, for probably ten years and then accepted a position on the Rock Island.

Sutton has had much railroad experience, having been a locomotive fireman before he accepted a place on the police force, and during the five years which he has served on the force he has had a constant longing for the return to the exciting life of a railroader. He and his wife will leave about the seventeenth of this month for their new home in Alamogordo, N. M. They will sell the majority of their household goods at their home at 1412 North D street, during the coming week preparatory to their move to New Mexico.

As yet it is not known who will succeed Sutton on the force, but it is very likely that his successor will be named as soon as the new Police Commissioner is selected to fill Mr. Merrill's place. There are numerous applications on file with the police board, awaiting vacancies.

THE NEW BRIDGE FOR SOUTH SIDE

The County Commissioners Expect to Let the Contract Next Spring.

MAY NOT ISSUE BONDS

SPECIAL FUND RAISED BY SPECIAL TAX LEVY MAY BE SUFFICIENT TO MEET THE COST OF STRUCTURE.

South Side citizens, who for years have been hoping for a bridge that would span the Whitewater in that section of Richmond, have been given to understand that there is every prospect that the Board of Wayne County Commissioners will let the contract for the structure next spring so that the work may be completed before winter.

The special fund created by the special bridge levy, will have reached the stage by that time so that the work can be undertaken. One member of the board of commissioners is quoted as saying that it may be possible to build the bridge without a bond issue, but this view is not generally shared. It is plain, however, that a bridge is needed over the Whitewater in the south part of Richmond, and the citizens feel that the county can issue bonds in payment if such a course is necessary. Just the same as has been done in other work of the kind. The new bridge will be a fine one though even a rough estimate as to the probable cost cannot be made. Bridge material now is double the cost that it was when the Doran bridge was built and is considerably more than when the Main street structure was erected.

Law Applicable to Porto Rico.
San Juan, Porto Rico, Sept. 8.—In the United States district court the demurrer of the Porto Rico Steamship company to the complaint of the Peck Steamship company, claiming \$100,000 damages for alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust law, was overruled by Judge Roddy, who held that Porto Rico is territory of the United States and that the Sherman anti-trust law therefore is applicable.

The Wayne County Democratic convention held yesterday at the city hall was attended by approximately 150 members of the party. Committeemen were named for the various townships; resolutions were adopted and a ticket was put in the field. The ticket nominated was as follows:

State Senator—M. H. Wolly, Williamsburg.

Representative—Joshua Allen, Hagerstown.

Commissioner Western District—M. E. Mason, Cambridge City.

Commissioner Eastern District—Humphrey Harrington, Fountain City.

Coroner—Dr. A. E. Ehle, East Germantown.

Nominations for other county offices were not made.

The resolutions adopted include an endorsement of William J. Bryan, but for some cause were placed at the very end.

Some of the other "planks" in the platform were as follows:

1—That we favor the election of United States Senators by popular vote.

2—That we favor a graded inheritance and income tax law.

3—That we favor a Bank Commission with powers similar to the Interstate Commerce Commission, to protect all depositors of money or property.

4—That we are in favor of tariff reform.
