After some further questions, as the writer remonstrated with him upon the folly of such a course, he raised his head from the ground,

and, half reclining, said that he had come so far already that he could not desist now. He stated that his village was pear Candra poor, four hundred and seventy miles east from there; that he had spent filteen months on the way thus far, and that it was forty miles more. Fancy and he wished to complete the pilgrimage. He was accustomed to go about a mile each day. He would then note the place where he had stopped, and walking back to the nearest village would remain until the next day, receiving his foud from the villagers. Then he would return, and from the place left the preceeding day, would begin again his toilsome pilgrimage. 
