is nothing like a free and independent day of  
doing, and fixing a stated time for paying  
debts. Secretary Chase would do well to  
take a lesson from the officers of the National  
Bank of Davenport, and fix the date when he  
will remit to the people what he owes them on  
his promise to pay.

But, joking aside, it is a good "weak," and  
we expect in the next issue of the Gazette to  
see the time changed by putting in the place  
of the "day of judgment" the "day of adjust-  
ment," which we probably shall see in the  
Gazette.
