The company today gave its miners the ultimatum to go to work or take their tools out of the mines, which is a discharge from further service.

A TOPEKA ROMANCE.

A Boarding House Noveltie Finds Its Way Into the Courts.

A boarding house romance found its way into the district court today. The case is one of spurned love at the expense of a foreclosed mortgage, and now the heroine was her household fixtures back and \$1,000 damages. Jennie Oliver has kept a select boarding house in the so-called "Marmont property" on Fourth street near Kansas avenue. But this week Constable Stonestreet, armed with a writ of replevin, possessed her of her household goods. He seized not only the furniture, bed room sets and carpets, but also her bible, refrigerator, underwear, handkerchiefs, dresses, stockings, books, plates, saucers, table silver, wash tubs, clocks and lamps. The unfortunate plaintiff literally had not where to lay her head.

Now Mrs. Oliver seeks to recover the replevied goods. She says she is the head of a family, the family consisting of herself, a child and the servants, and that her household goods as such are exempt from attachment under the laws of Kansas. She makes the defendant in her suit, Constable Stonestreet and W. W. Townsend, the latter being the one who had the property replevied in his brother's name. Townsend is said to have been infatuated with the widow Oliver, and said if she would marry him on or before January 1, he would not touch her household goods. Townsend is said to have pressed his suit persistently, that Mrs. Oliver had him arrested once for disturbing her peace.

THE SEAL MAKES TROUBLE

A Suit Over Prince Albert Court Lodge No. 85, Order of the Catalpa.

The plaintiffs say in their petition that they hold the special authority to organize lodges and initiate and confer degrees on members and that their Prince Albert Court lodge is the only legal one of that name in the state. They allege that Rufus Frazier is running a lodge under that name, but that the same is a shift, a trick, a subterfuge, fraud and infringement on the plaintiffs' rights. They say also that Frazier refuses to turn over to them the charter, books and big gilt seal of the order, although a demand has been repeatedly made for the same. Wherefore the plaintiffs ask that Frazier or his officers and agents be enjoined any body of persons, either as Prince Albert Court lodge of the order of Catalpa, and that they be further enjoined from using the seal of the lodge. The temporary injunction has been granted. A. M. Thomas is the attorney for the plaintiffs and W. I. Jamison represents the defendant.

FLEEING FROM FIRE.

Nebraska People Trying to Save Their Lives From the Prairie Fire.

OMAHA, Oct. 26.—A special to the Bee from Gordon, Neb., says: The prairie fire is now sweeping over the sand hills in this vicinity and is doing immense damage. The flames are traveling with almost lightning rapidity, and are consuming everything in their track.

At noon the fire is reported to have reached Pullman and the whole country in that neighborhood is a raging furnace. It is not known whether any lives were lost today, but thousands of head of cattle have perished. People in the track of the fire are fleeing for their lives, leaving all their property to the mercy of the flames.

HIAWATHA'S CAR WORKS.

The Charter for It is Filed at the State House.

The charter by which the Pullman Co-operative club propose to go into business at Hiawatha was this afternoon filed in the office of the secretary of state. The corporation is to be known as the Hiawatha Co-operative Car and Manufacturing company, and its capital stock is placed at \$50,000, which is to be divided into 500 shares at \$100 each.

The members of the Pullman Co-operative club are, according to the agreement filed with the charter, to have the privilege of selling their tools to the company at an appraised value, and they are to have an option on the purchase of all the stock for a period of three years.

The directors named in the charter are Charles Knott, J. D. Blair, B. S. Foster, M. G. Mann and Elias Moser of Hiawatha, and Lewis Myers, C. O. Allen, W. R. Cochran and Wm. F. Heslop of Chicago.
