CAPITALIZED AT \$250,000

Buy Tract Near Ball Park—\$20,000 Buildings.

The International Cattle Co., with a capital stock of \$250,000 which has been organized as a Kansas institution and which will have its main offices in the Mulvane building, 1111 Broadway, and sell pure bred cattle on an immense scale.

Buildings attractive in design will be erected immediately on the property north of the Western League ball park at a cost of approximately \$20,000. From this point livestock will be distributed arrangements having been made with the Santa Fe for the laying of tracks to the grounds. The property consists of twenty acres of ground which was purchased from Guilford Dudley.

The president of the new concern is Richard R. Morely, of Chicago, Ill. William Quail, of 301 Mulvane street, will serve as treasurer and special buyer. I. D. Graham, associate editor of the Kansas Farmer, will act as secretary after May 1, although he will continue to write for the farm paper.

Where Topeka will be the headquarters for the concern offices will be maintained in Chicago, Wichita, Omaha, Denver and Kansas City. Claude Makin, of Makin Brothers, of Grantville, Mo., well known breeder of Hereford cattle, will have charge of the Kansas City office.

The company will maintain a show herd of Hereford cattle that will be exhibited in the fair circuit in which the Kansas State Fair association belongs. This herd will also be shown at the world's fair at San Francisco.

The company is in a position to procure as many as 35,000 head of pure bred cattle should occasion demand.

One hundred and sixty acres of pasture land which is owned by William Quail and which is situated near Topeka will be used by the company.

Richard R. Morely, the president of the concern is the owner of big ranch properties. He has a Hereford herd in New Mexico, a ranch, consisting of 1,000 acres of land in Oregon county, which has been owned by him for five years, will be turned over for the use of the new company.

The concern is chartered under the laws of Kansas and is a Kansas institution. It has the approval of the Kansas banking department.

Why Topeka Was Selected.

It was located in Topeka on account of several distinct advantages. One of these is the protection of the Blue Sky law. Another is the fact that Topeka is centrally situated. Then the railway facilities are of considerable importance in the management of the company at first contemplated making Kansas City its headquarters. However, after hunting for a proper location for three months a decision was made to come to Topeka.

The buildings that will be erected on the property adjacent to the ball park will include livestock barns, a grain building, sales building, and stock pens. It is understood that they have been designed by Albert T. Reid, president of the Kansas Farmer Co.

I. D. Graham, who will serve as secretary of the company, has been secretary of scores of livestock and farm livestock organizations in Kansas. In a financial way his connection with the Kansas Farmer dates back to 1893.

JAPAN TREATY RIGHTS

Auto-Legislation in California Stirs Up Political Parties.

Tokio, April 12.—Irritation over the California land legislation is increasing throughout the country. All the political parties have sent deputations to the premier and foreign minister asking them to take measures to preserve Japan treaty rights in America. The constitutional party has proposed an anti-California boycott and the chambers of commerce have telegraphed to similar bodies in San Francisco and Los Angeles and elsewhere asserting that the result of the legislation will be disastrous for trade between the United States and Japan.

Washington, April 12.—Secretary Bryan was noncommittal when told of the Japanese government's instructions to Ambassador China. He expressed only the sentiment that it would be time to consider formal representations after the laws in question had been passed by the California legislature and were under consideration by the governor. Representative Raker told President Wilson today that Senator Sanford of California had given assurances that the alien land bill when finally passed would not conflict with any treaty obligations.

STOP RATE RAISE.

Commerce Commission Suspends Many Proposed Advances.

Washington, April 12.—The Interstate commerce commission today suspended the following proposed advances in freight rates: Switching tariff at Chicago of all roads connecting with the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul, in coal and coke traffic, suspended October 14. Increases from 10 cents to 15 cents in pounds on building stone from points in Minnesota to Kansas City and destinations in other states, suspended October 14. Increases on wheat from Kansas City to Illinois points for shipment east, until October 14.

Nearly Half Workmen in Country to Go Out Monday.

Employers Aiding Men in Demanding Suffrage.

Herstat, Belgium, April 12.—Employers here, although deploring the strike, have decided to aid their employees in participating in the demonstration in favor of equal suffrage. One manufacturer has undertaken to feed fifty children as long as the strike lasts. Other manufacturers have agreed to pay the strikers a week's wages.

The strike here will be almost complete. Only enough workmen will remain at their posts to keep the machinery in motion.
