ACT OF JUNE 27, 1890-INCREAS-ED RATE.—Order 377, July 24, 1901. Chiefs of Division: In view of Depart-mental decision of June 20, 1901, in case of Ambrose T. Sanquinette, Ctf. No. 994,-906, paragraph 6 on page 95 of a Treatise on the Practice of the Pension Bureau, approved by the Secretary of the Interior April 9, 1898, is amended to rend as follows:

"Should it (incapacity for earning a support by manual labor) be found, how-ever, not to have existed at the time when the original application was filed, but from a subsequent date prior to medical examination, the rate allowed the applicant from date of filling such declaration being below the maximum, may be increased from the date of the certificate of medical examination showing increased degree of incapacity for earning a support by manual labor." "Should it (incapacity for earning a support by manual labor) be found, how-ever, not to have existed at the time when the original application was filed, but from a subsequent date prior to medical examination, the degree of the disability of the applicant being below the maximum rating, may be increased accordingly from date when such wound or injury was in-surred, or disease contracted, provided the degree of disability for all contributory auses is thereby enhanced to a sufficient extent to justify a higher rating.

"Should it be found impossible to fix the exact date when such wound or injury was received or disease contracted, the higher rate shall commence from the date of the certificate of medical examination its existence."
