There is no provision of law permitting the drawing of 200 names additional, so that the old list has to do service for the remainder of the year. The jurors included in the Honokaa panel will be exempt from subsequent service, unless a similar condition as the present arises, which is not likely.

JULY BILLS ARE APPROVED.

Finance Committee Recommend Payment of July Accounts.

Supervisor Shipman from the Finance Committee reported to the Board Saturday morning salaries and outstanding bills for the month of July, which after considerable discussion was approved by the full Board.

The Committee recommend that the County Clerk be authorized and directed to certify monthly to the Auditor all salaries fixed by statute and that the Auditor be authorized to issue warrants in accordance with the County Act, to be paid out of the General Fund. This includes salaries of seven Supervisors, County Attorney, County Clerk, County Auditor, Treasurer, Sheriff and eight Deputy Sheriffs, aggregating \$1,898.32.

H. J. Lyman presented a claim for \$10 as secretary of the Puna Road Board which was disallowed on the ground of illegality, as the receipt by one and the same person of two salaries, which combined would amount to more than \$100, is strictly prohibited by Section 3, Act 16, Laws of 1903, Mr. Lyman being in receipt of a large salary as Deputy Tax Assessor for the District of Puna.

The labor pay-roll of the former road board of Kau was approved and the amount \$233.88 ordered paid to S. Kahuaue, claimant.

The claim of Theo. H. Davies & Co., Ltd., for labor, material and superintendence of the new Pahala road to the Volcano for April, May and June, amounting to \$626.38 was disallowed.

W. A. Schwallie, Kau, was allowed commissions amounting to \$53.07 on road taxes collected as deputy tax assessor.

The bill of Dr. John Holland for holding an autopsy on the body of Iwayami Nantao, a Japanese, at midnight at Pihoua, for \$20, which was certified by Sheriff Keolanui, was approved; also a

claim for \$5 for attendance at the instantly trial of Equilio Erisarero, which was approved, being regarded as a witness fee, which should be borne by the County.

The claim of D. A. Loebenstein for \$104 for services as government inspector on the Kalapana road was disallowed, the Committee holding that the item should be borne by the Territory.

The request of County Attorney Williams for an assistant, naming Noa W. Aluli at a salary of \$100 per month was approved, granting to Mr. Aluli full privilege to engage in private practice where the same does not conflict with the interests of the County.

Regarding the recommendation of County Attorney Williams for an appropriation of \$1500 for expenses of witnesses in criminal cases for the six months ending December 31, 1905, the Committee believed it was unnecessary to appropriate this amount in advance. The Committee recommended that all claims for witness fees should be allowed only when properly sworn to, certified and approved by the Board of Supervisors after such services had been performed. Only in this manner, they say, can the finances of the County be properly and economically administered.

The request of County Auditor Maguire for a deputy at a salary of \$100 per month, to act during his absence while engaged in auditing the books of deputy sheriffs throughout the County, was refused, the Committee failing to see the necessity for such periodical trips to examine the books of deputy sheriffs. They were of the opinion, that if there were any books requiring auditing, the same could be forwarded to the Auditor for examination.

A similar request for \$100 for traveling expenses made by the Auditor was likewise refused. The Committee also disapproved of the allowance of any specific sum for incidentals for the various county officers, and a request of the County Auditor for \$125 and of the County Clerk for \$100 was denied, maintaining that all expenditures should be submitted to the Board of Supervisors for approval and payment.

While the Committee believed that the Hilo Band was not a necessary adjunct to the county seat, they reported favorably upon the petition signed by 200 citizens of Hilo and vicinity, recommending that a suitable amount be appropriated for the maintenance of the band, as soon as all necessary expenses, salaries and work on roads and bridges had been properly provided for and when the finances of the County would permit.
