LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

Mrs. Grover Cleveland gave
birth to a girl at 2 o'clock p. m.
on Sept. 9th. This is the first
child born in the White House,
and an avalanche of congratula-
tions are streaming in on the
proud father. It is rumored that
there is considerable discussion
as to the name by which the new
arrival will be known, the Pres-
ident it is said preferring either
Frances or Rose.

The U. S. Cruiser Detroit has
been ordered to Brazil to protect
American interests in case of
serious trouble during the rum-
ored revolution.

Springfield (Mass.), Septem-
ber 11.—A. A. Zimmerman broke
the world's bicycle record for one
mile in an unofficial trial at
Hamden Park this afternoon, the
time being 2:01 3/5. This beats
Windle's world's record by one
second. The start was a flying
one.

Paris, September 8.—James
Gorden Bennett is seriously ill,
but is apparently on the road to
recovery.

The House of Lords has reject-
ed the Home Rule Bill by a vote
of 248 to 42. The Marquis of
Salisbury made a masterly speech
and was received with great en-
thusiasm. Outside the Parliam-
ent Houses a large crowd of
people had gathered which re-
ceived the result of the division
with tremendous cheering.

The Supreme Court has just
decided the Shortridge attempt
case in favor of the editor.

Some months ago when the
divorce suit of Price vs. Price
was called in the San Jose
Superior Court Judge W. J.
Loregan decided "that all per-
sons be excluded from the court-
room except the officers of the
court, the parties and their
counsel." It was further ordered
"that no public report of the
testimony be made."

On the following day Charles
M. Shortridge published in the
San Jose Mercury, of which he
was editor, an article containing
testimony.

Prince Bismarck is suffering
from sciatica in both hips parti-
cularly in the left one extending
downwards to the leg.

The French general elections
are completed, and the political
complexion of the Parliament is
unchanged. The government
continues to be at the mercy of
any possible combination of the
radicals and the extreme right,
and cannot command a solid
majority. A number of the best
known and leading politicians
have been defeated, such as Paul
de Cassagnac, Comenceau, Flo-
quet, de Man and others.

Jerome Bonaparte, the oldest
grand-son of King Jerome of
Württemberg, died on the 4th
inst. at Beverly, Mass., at the age
of sixty-three years.

President Cleveland returned
to Washington on the 30th of
August, after having submitted
