#### MONEY ORDER BUSINESS, U. S. A.

The total number of money-order offices on June 30th, was 5,927. The number of money-orders issued during the year was 8,807,556, of the value of \$117,329,406. The number of orders paid was 8,602,625, and the value of those paid and repaid was \$117,344,281. The total amount of fees received was \$1,101,-821. The ratio of improper payments to the total number of orders paid was as 1 is to 273, 471.

The gross domestic revenue of the bureau was \$911,704, the foreign revenue was \$99,915, on a total of \$1,011,619. The net revenue, after deducting expenses paid from appropriations, was \$159,104.

The total number of international money-orders issued was 446,326, of an aggregate value of \$7,717,832 .-The total number of money-orders of all kinds issued was 9,273,882, of an aggregate value of \$125,047,238; the total amount of fees received was \$1,272,060.

Postal notes have been extensively employed by the public since they were introduced, and comprised from twenty-five to thirty of the transactions.

The United States exchanges mon-ey-orders with the following countries: Canada, Great Britain, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, France, Jamaica, New Zaland, New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania, British Ludia and Postugal Gueluding the India and Portugal (including the Azores and Madeira Islands. ) - Ogle County Reporter.
