

**CHICAGO'S NEW EDUCATIONAL MOVE.**

The Chicago Manual Training School will be opened to pupils in the coming year. This school will differ from the High School in omitting from its required studies foreign and ancient languages, in giving prominence to mechanical drawing, and particularly in affording scientific instruction and actual practice in the care and use of tools. Throughout the course, one hour per day, or more, will be given to drawing, and not less than two hours per day to shopwork. The remainder of the school day will be devoted to study and recitation. Before graduating, each pupil will be required to construct a machine from drawings and patterns made by himself. A diploma will be given on graduation. Candidates for admission to the first year must be at least fourteen years of age, and must present sufficient evidence of good moral character. They must pass satisfactory examination in reading, spelling, writing, geography, English composition, and the fundamental operations of arithmetic as applied to integers, common and decimal fractions, and denominated numbers. Ability to use the English language correctly is especially desired. Pupils furnish their own books, drawing instruments and material, aprons, overalls and pocket tools. Shop tools are provided by the school. The atmosphere of the school must be one of moral purity and earnest work. No pupil will be retained whose habits are immoral or idle, or whose presence is for any reason an injury to his fellows. The school does not teach trades. Its aim is more comprehensive—it lays the foundation for many trades, and at the same time recognizes the value of intellectual discipline.—*Am. Paper.*

**THE USE OF SALT.**

We have received from a correspondent a letter making some inquiries into the use of salt, and we are given to understand that among other follies of the day some indiscreet persons are objecting to the use of salt, and propose to do without it. Nothing could be more absurd. Common salt is the most widely distributed substance in the body; it exists in every solid; and not only is everywhere present, but in almost every part it constitutes the largest portion of the ash when any tissue is burnt. In particular it is a constant constituent of the blood, and it maintains in it a proportion that is almost wholly independent of the quantity that is consumed with the food. The blood will take up so much and no more, however much we may take with our food; and, on the other hand, if none be given, the blood parts with its natural quantity slowly and unwillingly. Under ordinary circumstances a healthy man loses daily about twelve grains by one channel or the other, and if he is to maintain his health that quantity is to be introduced. Common salt is of immense importance in the processes ministering to the nutrition of the body, for not only is it the chief salt in the gastric juice, and essential for the formation of bile, and may hence be reasonably regarded as of high value in digestion, but it is an important agent in promoting the processes of diffusion and therefore of absorption. Direct experiment has shown that it promotes the decomposition of albumen in the body, acting probably by increasing the activity of the transmission of fluids from cell to cell. Nothing can demonstrate its value better than the fact that if albumen without salt is introduced into the intestines of an animal no portion of it is absorbed, while it all quickly disappears if salt be added. If any further evidence were required it could be found in the powerful instinct which impels animals to obtain salt. Buffaloes will travel for miles to reach a "salt-lick," and the value of salt in improving the nutrition and the aspect of horses and cattle is well known to every farmer. The conclusion therefore is obvious that salt, being wholesome, and indeed necessary, should be taken in moderate quantities, and that abstinence from it is likely to be injurious.—*London Lancet.*
