Three prisoners arrived from Maui by the Likelike.

FREDERICK MARRIOTT, proprietor of the S. F. News Letter, died Dec. 16.

The bark Caibarian sailed from San Francisco for Honolulu, December 27th.

The S. S. Mariposa brought one hundred and thirty-eight Chinese for this port.

LXONS & Levey will sell potatoes and onions on Monday at noon at their salesroom.

The preliminary examination of A. B. Spreckels for assault to murder M. H. de Young was to take place January 8th.

ONE of the men employed on the Puuhue ranch, Kohala, Hawaii, was killed the other day by being thrown from his horse.

FOREIGN jurors are required to be in attendance Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The whole of the week will probably be taken up by criminal cases.

A FOOT race, distance 100 yards, will take place on Emma Street this afternoon directly after the Band Concert, between H. J. Mossman and W. F. Love.

A LEPER arrived by the W. G. Hall yesterday from Kau, and two this morning by the Likelike from Maui. The three are at the leper receiving station.

THE small set of double harness made by Mr. Chas. Hammer for Mr. James Campbell's Shetland ponies, has been inspected and admired by a large number of persons. It will be moved from Mr. Hammer's store on Monday morning.

THIS morning the Chamber of Commerce had a meeting upon the currency question, and deferred final action until the regular meeting on Wednesday next.

HEREAFTER, when the steamers are first sighted Lucas's whistle will blow three times. When passing Coco Head it will blow twice, and once when the steamer is at the lighthouse.

THE attention of Engine Co. No. 1, Pacific Hose Co. No. 1, the Honolulu Rifles, and Mystic Lodge, K. of P., is called to the notices summoning them to the funeral of the late Mr. Fassett.

Two children, George and Eliza Jackson, residing on Emma street, were charged in the Police Court this morning with being common nuisances. After some evidence was heard, they were remanded until Monday. R. J. Pond, for violating express rules, was fined \$5 and \$1 costs.

In the Supreme Court yesterday the case of S. K. Mahoe, district judge of Waialua, for malpractice came up. As his commission had expired, the object of the complaint had been attained. J. W. Kelikou and J. H. Barenaba were also tried on the same charge. Considerable testimony was heard, and the case was submitted and taken under advisement by the Court. To-day H. N. Kahulu, district judge of Ewa, is on trial for malpractice.

Prof. Wayland, who arrived yesterday, is Dean of the Faculty of the Law School at Yale College, and was formerly Lieutenant Governor of the State of Connecticut. He was for three years President of the American Social Science Association. He is President of the Connecticut State Prison Directors, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Prison Association and has for several years been President of the Board of Associated Charities at New Haven.

THE Daily Hawaiian says that the prophecies of the BULLETIN and Oat's board giving the time of the Mariposa's arrival were both a long way off the mark. The BULLETIN announced that Lucas's whistle would blow at five minutes past ten o'clock for the steamer passing Coco head. It blew at 10 minutes past. Oats's prediction was that the steamer would arrive in port one minute past twelve o'clock. It arrived two minutes before.

THERE will be no services in Kawaiahao Church to-night. Tomorrow, except for the Sunday Schools, the Bethel and Fort Street Churches will be closed. Services will be held in Kawaiahao Church at 11 A. M. and 7 P. M., the hour of evening service being changed to give more time for the second meeting. All will be made welcome, but a special invitation is extended to men to attend the Sunday evening service. Gospel services will be held Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of next week.

THIS morning, as Pacific Hose Co. No. 1, were starting out to the fire, they were informed it was down at Lucas & Co.'s mill. They hitched their reel on to one of Lucas & Co.'s wagons, and had no sooner turned off King on to Fort Street when a native riding on the wagon fell off, and tripped up Fred. Harrison, who had hold of the handle of the hose reel. The consequence was the wheels ran over him, smashing one of his toes, and bruising his knee. Dr. Henri McGrew attended him, and he is doing well. The native had his arm considerably bruised.

ABOUT ten minutes before seven o'clock this morning word was received at the central office that there was a fire out at Palama. After some delay the Fire Department was notified and the fire bells rang. It proved to be a wooden house on the makai side of the road near the What Cheer House, occupied by natives, and having its origin from matches. The interior was considerably burnt, but owing to plenty of willing hands throwing on water, the damage does not amount to much. Being outside the city limits the Fire Department did not go to the scene.

ALL the Engine house flags are at half mast out of respect to the late George H. Fassett.

THIS morning about 9 o'clock one of the liveliest runaways that has taken place for a long time in this city, was witnessed on Fort Street. A horse attached to a heavy dray, owned by His Majesty the King, broke away from the Palace yard, out on to Hotel Street, turning on to Fort Street, where it first came into collision with the carriage of Mr. J. H. Paty, which was standing in front of Lycan & Co.'s store. Mrs. Paty was in the carriage at the time and had a miraculous escape, fortunately being unhurt. The wheels of the carriage were smashed and other damage done. The runaway next struck Chinese express No. 185, turning the carriage over, and throwing the driver out, but not hurting him. It next ran into the Rev. Lowell Smith's horse, slightly bruising it but doing no damage to the carriage. On the opposite side of the road was express No. 172, which had a hind wheel damaged. When the runaway reached Irwin & Co.'s store, it ran into Mr. Dimond's carriage, smashing one of the hind wheels all to pieces. Fortunately, Mr. Dimond, who was in at the time, sustained no injury. The runaway turned on to Queen Street, but getting tired stopped near the Government building without doing any further damage. The affair caused tremendous excitement, and Fort Street was thronged for a long time after by a curious crowd.
