EDITORIAL NOTES.

A Sydney despatch of January 27th says: "It is announced that the Cunard steamer Parthian is under an offer to the Pacific Mail Company to run between Sydney and San Francisco, in conjunction with the present vessels, the Australia and Zealandia". This looks like opposition come to stay on this route.

A pretty extended Samoan version of the recent action of Germany at Apia is given in to-day's paper. Germany seemingly does not have the neck of acquiring colonies so as to make the original occupants of the particular territory in question responsible for ensuing troubles. England alone, among the nations, seems to be master of the art of colonial acquisition, the peoples brought under her dominion being always, apparently, represented to the English people, as well as to themselves and the world, as receiving a just and beneficent fate. And, almost without exception, colonies acquired by England, in whatever manner, take remarkably little time in adapting themselves to their changed relations, their inhabitants speedily developing into the most devoted lieges of the Empire.

THE MERRY MAKERS.

This small but versatile troupe met a fair-sized audience in the Hawaiian Opera House last evening. Reversing the usual order, a screaming farce opened the bill—"The Fellow that Looks Like Me"—which put the audience in good humor. Mr. Wash. Norton then came along in burnt-cork, giving performances in succession on the banjo, tambourine, Japanese fiddle and bones, all the while keeping up a running fire of wit and song. He showed himself a master of the banjo, bringing truly delightful melodies therefrom; with the bones he gave marvellous imitations of the snare drum and horse-racing, and he compelled really agreeable strains from the single string of the Japanese fiddle—putting a very mirth-provoking face, literally, on his performances by working his mobile features into comical expressions. Mr. H. Norman sang, "The Wolf," exhibiting a rich and well-trained baritone so as to induce a loud roar. Mrs. Norton performed a remarkable box trick. A heavy trunk was, by request of Mr. Norton, inspected by experts from the audience—Messrs. C. E. Williams and Wicke, Jr.—who could find no false hinges, joints or parts. It was then locked, tied with four or five rounds of a rope, endwise and crosswise, a canvas cover being placed over all, buckled at close intervals. This operation took four minutes, and the trunk, being placed in a curtained cabinet, with Mrs. Norton was concealed from view until a knocking was heard at the expiration of about two minutes. Then the trunk was carried out, fastened as when last seen, but when opened Mrs. Norton emerged from within it, clad in a different costume from that worn when she retired. Mr. Hensley Leroy gave a song and Irish jig in character, evincing a natural and hence agreeable brogue and a broth of a dainty step. Mr. Wash. Norton now appeared in one of his best specialties, entitled "Proteus." Coming forward in evening dress, without taking any baggage along, he changed costume, even to hose, with bewildering suddenness, in full sight of the audience, assuming in succession the characters of a French military officer, a gentleman of the olden time in knee breeches, a washer-woman, a downeast old maid, and a lady of the period, with each change giving verbal sketch and song in keeping with the character. This part of the entertainment alone more than half discounts the admission fee. Mr. Norman sang "The Desert" with equal acceptance to his first effort, and the performance concluded with a fine exhibition of sleeping in midair, by Mrs. Norton who at the same time appeared in pretty tableaux representing Ire-

land, Scotland, Hawaii, Columbia and Britannia, Mr. Edward Bridge assisting with the lime light. Messrs. West, Dow & Co. supplied handsome furniture and a piano for the occasion. The audience seemed to be highly pleased with the whole performance, and good houses may be expected for the succeeding appearances of the happily termed Merry-Makers.
