In the Hamburg Magdeburg Co., of Hamburg, A. Jaeger, agent, \$33,000; the Lion Insurance, \$7,000; the Washington Co., \$6,000, and the Orient, \$2,500, making the total insurance by companies which Mr. Jaeger represents \$48,500. Twenty-eight thousand, five hundred dollars of this was on Wing Wo Chan & Co., \$10,000 on the building and \$18,500 on the stock. Four thousand dollars was on the Paiko Block and \$5,000 on Swan's building, balance in small lots and scattered.

Castle & Cooke had no insurance in any of the buildings or stock that burnt last night. The insurance is entirely with foreign companies and a knowing person says it will bring money into the country.

The Empire Saloon and stock were insured for \$9,500.

An insurance agent was insuring houses during the conflagration.

Following is a recapitulation of the risks held by the different agencies: Hackfeld & Co. \$84,000 A. Jaeger 48,500 Irwin & Co. 37,000 C. O. Berger 25,000 G. W. Macfarlane & Co. 6,400 T. H. THE BRITISH SAILORS.

The gaps made by the tearing down of buildings were effected by the assistance of detachments of sailors and marines from H. B. M.'s steamships Heroine and Satellite, some of whom were ashore on leave, and others had been sent from the ships immediately on the outbreak of the fire. The jolly naval heroes worked with tremendous energy and enthusiasm, and their splendid order and discipline caused their efforts to tell. At whatever point their services were engaged, results were at once apparent.

THE NEED OF THE HOUR.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Honolulu has been visited by fire a destructive but cleansing. A large part of the irredeemably unsanitary district of the town has been razed to the ground and made sweet and clean.

Now is the opportunity for a radical reform in the sanitary arrangements of that part of the town that has never before offered and may never offer again. Not to use the present opportunity would be almost criminal neglect, and should the men who form the present government as incompetent and unfit to hold authority. Blame, too, show not be withheld from the community if it does not take steps to suggest, and demand if need be, such changes and reforms as are called for.

What are these reforms? 1st. Certain streets should be opened where none have been before; for example, Hotel street should be run out to the water and beyond. The necessary surveys should not be delayed an hour longer than possible. 2nd. No building should be allowed on the burnt district until these surveys have been made and the necessary streets have been marked out.

3rd. Buildings on the burnt district should be allowed to be put up only in accordance with certain regulations which should be issued as soon as possible by the Minister of the Interior.

Let Honolulu but use its present great opportunity and it may emerge from this disaster, which has brought distress and ruin to so many, improved, rejuvenated, cleansed—a sweeter, healthier and more sanitary town than it can ever pretend to have been before. E.

terminate life. She was at the residence of Mr. A. Kunuiakea, Palama, when the event happened. Mrs. Kapena was the daughter of David Malo, the Hawaiian historian, and was about forty years of age. She had been married to J. M. Kapena—years, and leaves one daughter, a young lady just budding into womanhood, as the result of the union. Mrs. Kapena was a lady of more than ordinary intellect, of superior education, and much respected.
