MAJOR J. H. Wodehouse, H. B. M.'s Commissioner, and Monsieur Henri Feer, French Commissioner, had a lengthy interview with the Minister of Foreign Affairs yesterday.

R. W. LAINE, Esq., Consul for Mexico, has suspended in his office a unique calendar for the present year. It is a Mexican production, and shows a variety of Mexican buildings and characters, beautifully lithographed in colors.

Mr. E. T. Booth has been induced, by persuasion of his friends, to remain in Honolulu until the departure of the steamship Australia, February the 16th. Mr. Booth will employ the time in prosecuting his temperance mission among the native Hawaiians.

THE Pacific Navigation Co. has purchased the coal that came by the bark Lady Lamson the other day. The Lady Lamson will dock at Brewer's wharf, to-morrow morning, to discharge. The coal will be stacked near the lime kiln. Half will be sent to Kuaui, and the other half will be used on the Surprise.

THE day before yesterday a carriage got stuck in the mud at the upper end of Liliha street. After many attempts to extricate the vehicle, the driver finally gave it up. He unhitched the horse, mounted him, and rode off, leaving the carriage fast in the mud, as a monument of misery and as a signal of danger.

By way of adding to the attractiveness of Mr. Osman Day's lecture on Napoleon Bonaparte, he has obtained a life size portrait of the immortal hero, in crayons, which is at present on exhibition at the Club House Dining Rooms. The lecture takes place to-morrow evening, commencing at 8 o'clock.

PUPILANI, a well known old native whose home is at Moanalua, and who has carried on a lively business at the rear of the Bay Horse Saloon for many years, was yesterday found guilty of selling liquor without a license, and sentenced to pay a fine of \$400. His counsel noted an appeal to the Supreme Court.

THE schooner Mary Foster arrived this morning from Lahaina, and reports the steamer Kinanau 9 1/2 hours to Lahaina last Monday, the Hall 9 hours on Tuesday, and the Iwalani 11 hours on Wednesday. The usual time is about 6 hours and 45 minutes. The Captain of the Mary Foster also reports heavy seas in the channel.

LECTURE IN AID OF GEO. W. DE LONG POST.

Mr. R. T. Booth repeated his war lecture—Three Years in the Ranks—last evening in the Y. M. C. A. Hall. The "repeat" was by request of the Geo. W. De Long Post, G. A. R., and in aid of the Relief Fund of that worthy organization. Mr. J. T. White, an earnest and energetic member of the Post, had charge of the decorations for the occasion, and succeeded in making an artistic and tasteful display of flags as could be imagined. At the back of the platform, directly behind the speaker, was hung a large portrait of Lieutenant-Commander Geo. W. DeLong, with two large American flags on each side, and the Hawaiian flag showing between their folds above the portrait. In the centre of the hall, before the ceiling, were four American flags crossed in a way to produce a pleasing effect. Banners, representing every State in the Union, were hung around the walls of the hall. The room was comfortably filled with an attentive and interested audience. Post-Commander R. W. Laine presided, and the members of the Post sat in a body near the platform. The lecture was preceded by some inspiring music. Mr. H. W. Morse sang "Tramp, Tramp," Mrs. Cruzan, "Take up your gun and go, John;" Mr. Yandley, "Marching through Georgia," the audience joining heartily in the choruses in each case. The Chairman offered a few remarks that were brief but pointed, and then gave place to Mr. Booth, who went over pretty much the same ground as on the first occasion of delivering the lecture. Many of the audience had heard it before, but they seemed to listen with all the interest and interest of persons hearing a new story. The lecture occupied most of two hours, and enchaind the attention of the entire audience from beginning to end. Frequent applause greeted the speaker, which seemed to inspire him with augmented fervor. The Geo. W. De Long Post is to be congratulated on securing the re-delivery of this interesting lecture, and on a nice little needed addition to their Relief Fund.
