RUINING THE COUNTRY.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The idea that the country must be saved at all hazards is a favorite and taking method with demagogues and political managers in accomplishing their ends. Certain measures of questionable morality, or even evident dishonesty, are pressed upon the followers of a party by its leaders on the plea of "saving the country." That was the game played by the Southern slave-holders for many a year in the United States. They knew that they held the balance of power. They knew that citizens who loved their country, would tremble as for the Ark of God, if the Constitution should be held to deny slave-holders the right not only to hold slaves, but to take them where their owners pleased; thus establishing in a quasi-legitimate fashion the institution of slavery all over the the country.

We have a parallel case now in the present state of opinion in regard to the King's veto power. The Constitution, as interpreted by the Supreme Court Judges, not only does give, but was intended to give a personal veto power to the King. Yet multitudes of our citizens are so afraid of doing such a thing, as the Constitution declares shall be done, that they seem ready to forget all obligations of truth, honor, and righteousness, in denying to the King what those who made the Constitution intended to give him, and did give him. "But, if you do this, and give H. M. Kalakaua such power, you will ruin the country." We are reminded of what Abraham Lincoln said in his famous speech in Cooper Hall, when in speaking of these self-styled Union-savers, he exposed the illogical iniquity of those, who said that the men who denounced slavery as a crime and a blot, would be the men responsible for the destruction of the Union. Speaking of this talk of the Secessionists he said, "You say the Union will be destroyed, and the crime of having destroyed it will be upon us. That is cool. A highwayman holds a pistol to my ear, and mutters through his teeth: stand and deliver; or I shall kill you, and then you will be your own murderer." But is not that the position of those who who know that the Constitution gives the King the veto power and now say to him, "Give it up, or the country will be ruined."

QUEEN'S HOSPITAL.

MEETING OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees of the Queen's Hospital held their quarterly meeting at the Chamber of Commerce, at 10 o'clock this morning. Vice-President Hon. Chas. R. Bishop presiding.

The Treasurer made an informal statement showing that \$3,759.33 were due him.

The reports of the physician and purveyor were read and accepted.

The visiting committee suggested better facilities for hot baths. Placed in the hands of Executive committee.

The Vice-President appointed Messrs. J. S. Walker, M. P. Robinson and Rev. Alex. Mackintosh as the Visiting committee for the ensuing quarter.

The following resolution was presented and adopted:

Resolved—That whatever sum may be received from the Executors of the will of Her late Majesty the Dowager Queen Emma shall be added to the legacy fund, and only the interest received thereon shall be used for the general expenses of the hospital.

Mr. A. J. Cartwright, executor of the above, has handed to the Treasurer the sum of \$2,738.44.

Following is the surgeon-superintendent's quarterly report:

HONOLULU, Feb. 29, 1888. To the Trustees of the Queen's Hospital:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending Feb. 29, 1888.

The number of patients at present in the Hospital is 41; viz.: 22 Hawaiians (12 males, 10 females), 1 Chinese, 1 Japanese and 17 of other nationalities; 16 paying.

The number of admission during the quarter was 71; viz.: 22 Hawaiians (17 males, 5 females), 6 Chinese, 8 Japanese and 35 of other nationalities.

Discharged 71; viz.: 28 Hawaiians (16 males, 12 females), 4 Chinese, 6 Japanese and 33 of other nationalities.

Deaths 8; viz.: 2 Hawaiian males, 2 Chinese, 2 Japanese and 2 of other nationalities.

The causes of death were as follows: Anemia 1, Apoplexy 1, Cirrhosis of liver 1, consumption 3, disease of heart 1, general debility 1.

The highest number of indoor patients was 49; lowest 35; daily average 40.

Number of prescriptions 1235. Calls at the dispensary, 141.

The number of patients treated at the Hospital was as follows: December 1887, 72; January 1888, 65; February, 1888, 51.

IN THE SUPREME COURT of the Hawaiian Islands. In the matter of R. W. LAINE, against whom a Petition for adjudication was filed on the 1st day of August, 1888, in said court, in Bankruptcy, before Mr. Justice Preston.
