Annual Session in Chicago—Remarkably Warm Proceedings

The National Woman's Christian Temperance Union has held its annual meeting in Chicago. All the officers were re-elected.

Gen. Neal Dow of Maine in a speech denounced the partisan element of the society. At the closing session the battle between the Union and the non-partisan delegation of Iowa reached a climax.

The minority report was brought in by Mrs. Mattie M. Bailey of the Iowa delegation, and read as follows: "The recent amendment contests demonstrate the need of more persistent and persuasive educational temperance work among all classes of people."

"Unjust because if this organization is non-partisan, as our President has lately declared, such a pledge of influence, support or allegiance, representatively given, interferes with the individual freedom of any and every member to prefer and work for the political party of her choice."

After a brief discussion the majority report was adopted, the Iowa delegates alone voting for the minority report. Mrs. Ellen J. Foster then arose and read a long protest on behalf of the Iowa delegation.

The convention then adopted a resolution authorizing the Executive Committee to immediately take steps to reorganize a union in Iowa.

The convention thereupon passed the following resolution: "We have seen what seems to us to be amply sufficient proof that the Vice-President of the United States has permitted a bar to be opened in his new apartment house at Washington, and we express our amazement, grief and condemnation that at this advanced stage of temperance reform the second official of the Government should thus openly ally himself with the liquor dealers of the nation."
